I love Easter when it is late in the season. It gives nature a chance to catch up with theology and bless us with warmer temperatures for Easter egg hunts, with sunshine and green leaves and flowers, with the majestic metaphor of life springing forth from winter's death. A resurrection acted out before our very eyes.

Easter is about new birth, about being born not only into the physical world, but of the Spirit, into the realm of eternity. In 1st Corinthians, Paul writes that immortality must be put on, along with imperishability, like a coat or a shirt or a pair of jeans. Putting on immortality is not a given and is also not a human achievement. It is a gift of God, accepted by faith.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus has a conversation with a man named Nicodemus, in which he introduces the idea of new birth, causing Nicodemus to try, rather comically, and conceive a way for a full-grown person to re-enter his mother's womb in order to come out a second time.

But the clearest biblical presentation of this new life is the resurrection of Jesus itself, presented in the simplest terms by the gospel writers. In



Mark it is a simple announcement. The angel said, "He has risen, he is not here, see where they laid him. Go . . . and tell."

There are a few stories about having seen him; Mary in the garden, the disciples on the road to Emmaus, the upper room, and the seaside trip to Galilee while they were all fishing. But the truest story of the resurrection is the way it has enlivened the lives of the believers ever since. We are not told everyone's story, but the stories we are told tell us of lives filled with meaning, convictions that run deep enough to last a lifetime and that overcome objections to faith and the failures of the faithful, a sense of calmness in the face of the world's chaos.

Even 2,000 years later people still experience its power. It is our prayer this Easter for each of us, that its power might be experienced once again, reminding us of God's love, and the gift of eternal life that is higher than all the words we use to describe it.

I leave you with the conclusion of Paul's exposition about resurrection in 1 Corinthians 15:50-58:

"I declare to you, brothers and sisters, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of (Continued on page 2)

When the perishable has been clothed with the imperishable, and the mortal with immortality, then the saying that is written will come true:

'Death has been swallowed up in victory'

Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain."

- -Don't try to talk from behind the person or from too far away. Be sure to face the person.
- -Don't hold you fingers or hand in front of your mouth when you speak.
- -Most of all, be patient. Thanks,

Financial Update


General Fund expenditures for the first quarter of 2025 have exceeded income by \$2,608. Mission giving is on target to meet our annual goals. In March, we met our goal for the America For Christ offering. Your contributions to our operating expenses, missions, and capital improvements are appreciated.

Mission Support

Since Jeni Pedzinski and Sarah McCurdy have left the foreign mission field, we have been examining other missionaries to support. In light of the devastation in Goma, Parish Council has decided to send the \$200 per month that would have gone to specific missionaries to support OHGS - Goma Relief.

Tower Repair Project Update

While we still do not have a definite start date from Durable Slate, we are hopeful that work on the tower will begin soon. The project will include replacing any missing or damaged slates on the upper tower roof and repairing the roof overhang. The slate over the lower portion of the roof will be replaced along with gutters and some painting.



The cost of the project is estimated at \$49,550. We are seeking gifts, donations, and memorial contributions to offset the cost of the project. Our goal is to replenish our Capital Improvements Fund. As of Mar. 31st, we have received \$13,061 for the project. Your pledges and donations are appreciated.
