DEACONS MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS

At the annual meeting the Board of Deacons and Deaconesses offered three recommendations to the congregation. They are:

1) This church, along with every

other like-minded fellowship and especially the free churches, face the crises of our time. As a fellowship united in loving concern for each other and for the ministry of Christ. we must turn to God and selflessly pray for the revelation of our place in this ministry, and for the resources we need to meet the challenge. Together we need to discover a sense of direction, an aim and purpose, and in the spirit of joyful anticipation engage in mission. 2) This Board needs to understand. better what specifically is expected of it by the fellowship as a whole. What do we really mean by the "work of the deacons?" What is intended by our constitution where it charges the board with assisting the pastor in caring for the "spiritual needs of the church?" What are these spiritual needs? How, and by whom should the determination be made? As any new sense of mission emerges, what role should the board assume with regard to it? Should the board be regarded as a proxy unon whom is transferred the duties and obligations of individual church members, or should the board be looked to for leadership by a responsive fellowship? 3) The chairman recommends that in the coming year the church as a whole. and thru its boards and committees, make a serious study of these issues and questions and report their honest convictions to the board. This response might then become the basis

upon which the board begins to serve

the church in a more relevant and fruitful way than has been the case in the recent past.

AMERICAN BAPTIST SENATOR SPEAKS

Mark Hatfield, Republican Senator from Oregon and a prominent American Baptist layman, discussed his views in the current issue of FAITH AT WORK. Excerpts follow:

My position on the war is the result of a long process of study, evaluation, and prayer. In my view the war is immoral and our national policy is immoral...We have come to accept the destruction of human life in official terminology that is the language of the slaugher terhouse: "kill ratios, body counts."

The present administration's Vietnamization policy was at one time, I believe, a policy aimed at finding peace. But now I'm convinced that it is an effort to create the concept that as long as we reduce the loss of American lives, though increasing the loss of Asian lives, it is a sound policy. The object is not peace, but to continue the war and kill more of the enemy than we lose on our side. To me that is an immoral policy, and I campot sup-I couldn't support it port it. under President Johnson; why should I be so hypocritical as to support it under a Republican president

just because we're in the same political party?... As a Christian I cannot accept this war policy because it has so degraded the sacredness of human life.

With regard to military spending, I have long believed that the
real strength of a nation is its
people, and that the most aggressive type of battle against Communism is to drain the swamps in
which Communism breeds - ignorance,
injustice, illiteracy, poverty.

MINISTER SPEAKER AT AMBRIDGE, PA.

Your minister was guest speaker at the First Baptist Church, Ambridge, Pa., August 15. Rev. Ted D. Stephenson is minister of the Ambridge church.

Two years ago I became acquainted with a woman who was in her late nineties. Alert and witty, her zest for life was matched by an unfortunate propensity for mishaps. The trend had started when she was middle-aged; she was riding in a car driven by her husband, the brakes failed, he ditched the vehicle, and the woman's hip was broken, causing a permanent limp. "I'm always on the side that gets ditched," she said with a smile.

And it seems that she was correct. Much of her life was plagued with ill-nesses and accidents of various sorts. Yet through it all she maintained a spirit of buoyancy and optimism. She told me that she had the patience of Job.

While her positive attitude is to be admired, her statement reflects a common misconception about the story of Job. The fact of the matter is that Job was not a patient man. He had been a prosperous individual, enjoying the financial security of great possessions and the emotional security of health and family, only to lose both in a tragic turn of events.

Job was stunned. And he responded to his misfortune by crying out against the injustice of it all. "God destroys blameless and wicked alike. I am ready to argue with Him." Job's friends, who had come to offer him comfort, were horrified by such irreverent talk. Yet they were at a loss to disprove his argument.

Today mankind still puzzles over the problem of evil in the world. Society is plagued with an amazing array of difficulties ranging from natural disasters to personal problems. Are we to blame God for these?

The answer is no. The reason why they do happen, however, is a mystery. The answer which Job received was that such mysteries are beyond the perception and understanding of man.

But while such things have not been revealed to us, throughout the Bible we are reminded again and again that God is love, not hate, and that there is no need to be fearful If we put our trust in Him. The life of Christ speaks most eloquently of the real nature of God, reassuring us of God's forgiveness, love, and deep concern for each of His children.

In spite of his impatience, Job learned of God's goodness, and this can be a lesson for us. "We know that in everything God works for good with those who love Him." (published in the Beaver Valley Times)
