It's the only thing that can assure me of acceptance and love. I'm afraid you'll think less of me, that you'll laugh, laugh would kill me.

So I play my game, my desperate pretending game, with a facade of assurance without, and a trembling child within. And so my life becomes a front. I idly chatter to you in the suave surface tones... to tell you of everything that's nothing, and nothing of what's everything, of what's crying within me. So when I go into my routine do not be fooled by what I am saying. Please listen carefully to hear what I am not saying.

I dislike the superficial, phony game I'm playing. I'd like to be genuine and spontaneous, and me. You've got to hold out your hand even when it seems to be the last

thing I seem to want, or need. Only you can call me into aliveness. Each time you're kind, and gentle and encouraging, each time you try to understand because you really care, my heart begins to grow wings, small wings.

I want you to know how important you are to me, how you can be a creator of the person that is me if you choose to. But it will not be easy for you. A long conviction of worthlessness builds strong walls.

The nearer you approach me, the blinder I may strike back. It is irrational, but I am irrational. I fight against the very things I cry out for. But I am told that love is stronger than walls, and therein lies my hope. Please try to beat down those firm walls with firm hands, but with gentle hands - - for a child is very sensitive.

Who am I, you may wonder? I am someone you know very well. I am every man and every woman you meet.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR RESEARCH

This, particular project seeks to establish comparative losses of memory for various types of visual and verbal materials contained in high By comparing the school annuals. performance of groups whose high school graduation dates back from one month to 40 years, it becomes possible to establish memory functions over a period much longer than the usual laboratory studies of memory permit.

WORLD WIDE COMMUNION OCTOBER 1

The churches of the world traditionally observe the first Sunday in October as a day of fellowship thru the service of Holy Communion. American Baptists use this day as the time of their annual world fellowship offering. Although we work in 12 overseas fields, the three India fields are receiving special attention this year.

In South India, Baptists have worked with notable success with the Telugus. Many churches are being organized. From the very beginning literacy programs have been an important _ mission work in northeast India. Modern day Assamese in this area credit early missionaries with having saved their language by learning it and printing it. Literature has been translated and printed in some 45 languages. With her millions, India has faced the problem of hunger. Missionaries are providing training pro grams to produce a "green revolution." The Council of Baptist Churches of Northeast India recently took responsibility for 15,000 Bangladesh refugees, providing food, shelter, clothing, and medical care.

In addition to the attention given India in the world fellowship offering, it will be the subject of study by the Women's Mission Society and the entire church. Helen Aleshire and Bertha Mc-Taggart recently attended a seminar on India at the Worthington Methodist Church sponsored by the Columbus Church Women United. Your minister will be attending an Asian Studies Seminar at Ohio State University later in October.

INTERESTED IN JOINING A SINGLES GROUP?

Interest has been expressed in several churches in forming one or more groups for single persons. If you have an interest, speak with the minister about it. Your suggestions are sought.

ISSUE TWO ON BALLOT

Issue 2, a constitutional amendment that stops collection of the state income tax, is on the ballot. It would repeal the two new Ohio graduated taxes which are providing nearly a fourth of the state's revenues.

Since the cuts would go into effect Jan.

1, schools, cities, counties, and the legislature would face an immediate emergency.

This is why no responsible political figures have endorsed Issue 2, and why it is opposed by such groups as the League of Women Voters, Ohio Education Association, and the Ohio buncil of Churches. This is truly a non-partisan question.

If Issue 2 is passed, it would cut corporation taxes by \$148.2 million the first year; more thereafter. It would raise property taxes by at least 10%. Local taxpayers would be asked to make up losses in state support. It would also end the Homestead Excemption funding at an average loss of \$105 to qualifying retired householders.

Even a 2 cent increase in the sales tax would not be enough to replace the revenues lost. Any increase in the sales tax will fall harder on those needing most of their incomes for necessities than on the more fortunate. Example: a two cent higher sales tax would cost the typical Ohio family of four, with \$10,000 income, a total of \$82. An Ohio family with \$50,000 income would pay only \$146. The sales tax increase would increase the tax burden of low income groups by as much as 300% while reducing the new taxes of high income groups to less than one tenth of their former amount.

Ohio House Speaker, Republican Charles Turfess, has taken a strong stand against Issue Two, and said that supporters of income tax repeal are "hoodwinking" the public with their proposal..

CHRISTMAS CLEARING HOUSE & CHRISTMAS CENTER

The Christmas Clearing House and Christmas Center came into being as our county grew, to make sure that all the children who need help have a happy Christmas and avoid having some families receive an abundance and others nothing on Christmas morning.

Families are recommended by the Welfare Dept., Health Dept., CAO, schools, churches and are on file at the Council of Social Agencies office. They will be helped by being invited to the Christmas Center or by being adopted.

The Center came into being because of changing attitudes about how we help people in need. Only parents come to the center to receive what the community has given to help their families. In the act of coming in, there is involvement of the arents in having some part in making thristmas possible for their families. The response of these people has been so satisfying that we feel this kind of help in most cases is better than taking Christmas to people. There are always exceptions, of course.

Needed are all kinds of canned or boxed foods, including: fruit, juices, vegetables, soups, cereals, etc. NO home canned goods or perishables.

The JC's and JCettes have the toy shop at the Christmas Center. They need new toys to make sure there are enough for all the children.

Food and toys may be brought to the Delaware Inn from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday thru Saturday, thru Dec. 20.

Money is also needed. This provides gift certificates for clothing for children between the ages of 11 thru seniors in high school. These are non-transferable. Checks may be made out to Christmas Clearing House and sent to Council of Social Agencies, Delaware Inn.

Your contributions may be brought to the church anytime before Dec. 20 (there will be boxes for your convenience) or to the Center as explained above. THIS CAN BE THE HEART AND ESSENCE OF YOUR CHRISTMAS.

FAITH ON THE FOOTBALL FIELD

Don Cockroft reclined in a chair by the sliding glass doors that opened onto a tiny patio. At his elbow a Bible lay open on an end table. He frequently referred to passages in the Bible to support his observations.

The Bible is the most important book in his life. It is more vital to him

than his playbook.

It wasn't always that way, said Cockroft, the Cleveland Brown's punter and place kicker who is enjoying his finest season in pro football. Until this year the playbook ranked right up there with the Bible in his order of priorities. That was a mistake, he confessed.

"In the past," he said, "I was ready to give up everything to follow Christ except football. Now I can give up foot-

ball."

"I would like to kick for as many years as I can," he said, "But God has a plan for all of us. Being a Christian and accepting the Word of God as it is, I want to follow the plan. I don't know what the future holds, but I know who holds the future."

In the meantime, he believes he is playing football with God's blessing. He gives God credit for helping provide the recent 26-24 victory over Pittsburgh.

Cockroft said God was listening to him when he asked for a second chance to kick a field goal in that game. (He had missed a possible game winning field goal

with time running out)

"When I missed the field goal with two minutes left I began to doubt. John Garlington was the first to meet me on the sidelines and he said I'd get another chance. Cliff Brooks said the same thing. So I hoped I'd get a second chance. There's faith in hope. God was listening."

Last winter and spring Don enrolled in a Bible course at Nazarene Bible College. He was seeking a refresher so he could make a greater contribution at weekly Bible discussions attended by some of the team members.

"I read that the Baltimore Colts held Bible meetings and I thought we needed that."

Certainly there has been a transformin the Browns team as a whole. Backup men replaced regulars and are playing like all-conference candidates. Last minute heroics have left national television viewers breathless and limp.

An unabashed evangelist, Cockroft knows that the next time he's standing alone with the outcome of a game hinged on his field goal, he won't really be alone.

"There are a lot of guys on our team just like me," says Cockroft.
