The Dec. 30 issue of TIME magazine carried an eight page feature article on the Bible. The editors titled it, THE BIBLE: THE HELIEVERS GAIN. Although some of you may find portions of the article to be negative, there are three points which deserve your attention. First, the Bible is gaining popularity "among people of all spiritual stripes - or none at all. Translated into 1,526 languages, it is being bought by or sent to more people than ever before . . Zondervan Publishing House reports sales of all editions this year are five times as great as they were four years ago. "Second, the article includes "A Bible Buyer's Catalogue" which describes 11 translations which are currently available. You will find this helpful when you purchase a new Bible for yourself or for a gift. Third, the article concludes with these words - "the persistent message of the Bible will not go away . . . God intervened in history to help man. Whether it was at the time of the Exodus, the giving of the Law, the Incarnation or the Resurrection . . ordinary human history was interrupted, and has never since been the same."

Baptists are a people of the Bible. Our movement started with it and it is our only statementment of faith. I feel a great need for us to go back (which is really going forward!) to the basics of Biblical Christianity. January is our month of dedication. January 19 is Sunday of Dedication when we shall have an opportunity to make a personal act of commitment to the Christ we meet both in the pages of the Scripture and within our own souls. Thus we begin a new year by placing curselves and our church at the CENTER of God's purpose and plan.





Pledges received to date total \$15,561,60 or \$9,294.40 short, approximately 37% less than the proposed budget. We know that there are other funds that will come in that is not pledged, but even that will leave us \$3,937.00 short or about 15%. Perhaps you feel the need to increase your pledge; if you didn't pledge. yet and would like to, I need it before the Jan. 8 annual business meeting. Some who do not give at the present time need very much to examine their circumstances, the need of the church, and their commitment to the teachings of Jesus about our responsibility toward Him. Otherwise

serious cutbacks in the work of the church will be necessary to keep within the money available. God does not want this to happen I'm sure. He will provide for our needs, but we must be the vessels, willing to be used of God. God bless you in the new year.

LENTEN SCHEDULE



Lent is the season of 40 days preceding Easter, not counting Sundays. It has been observed in the church since early times as a time of fasting and penitence, but the emphasis most common now is renewal and growth in Christ. In other words, it is better to grow up than to cry out. The word "Lent" is from an old Anglo-Saxon term for spring. Below you will find listed some of the activities prepared for

you by your church. By the way, why is a lamb used as a symbol for Christ?

There will be a special Lenten Group scheduled which will have as its theme, "Living the Christ-Way." It might also be called a Discipleship Class for adults. The group will meet each Sunday night at 7:15 beginning February 16 - but note the first session will be after the monthly song service, about 8pm or a few minutes later. The March 16 session will also be after the monthly song service. So, every Sunday night in Lent at 7:15 except for Feb. 16 and March 16 when it will be after the song service. OK? Every person who attends will receive a free copy of "Jesus," published by the American Bible Society and consisting of the story of Jesus taken from Today's English Version. If you have questions about the group and what we are planning, call the church office.

In addition to the class on Sundays, the Wednesday night Bible study will continue at 7:00pm. We are now studying the letter to Ephesus but by Lent will be on a different portion of Scripture. Watch the weekly bulletin for details.

Maundy Thursday Communion in the Fellowship Hall will be at 8:00pm, March 27. The community Good Friday service will be held but details are not now available. We anticipate holding an Easter Sunrise service followed by breakfast and Easter worship in our Sanctuary at 10:30am. Easter is March 30.

This may sound irreverent, but we really don't do too well on our knees. Jesus wanted more to be followed than worshipped. I think we sometimes believe that if we approach Jesus on our knees He will be disarmed by our apparent piety and not notice that we haven't pitched in anywhere.

MISSION EFFORT PLANNED FOR APRIL

According to reliable sources, the Board of Christian Education has secured the services of the two top persons in the Ohio Baptist Convention mission picture to serve as resource leaders for mission education programs in April.

Rev. George Calhoun, minister of World Mission Support, and Rev. Focke Ferre, Director of the Ohio Forward program have been confirmed for special services on two consecutive Sundays. The Board of Deacons and Deaconesses have approved the use of the regular worship service time for their presentations. These men will also be available for informal discussion during the church school hour and at a luncheon at the church if there is interest enough to make it worthwhile.

A spokesman for the Board declared that changing concepts of Christian mission calls for a fresh approach in efforts to make the whole church aware of the changes and of the emerging role of denominations, churches and individuals in this phase of Christian ministry, and it is hoped that these encounters will not only be inspirational and informative, but also times for critical questioning of policy and administration.

Since the availability of the two OBC staff persons has just recently been confirmed, detail planning has yet to be worked out. Hopefully this will involve all of the church boards as well as the WMS.

If these efforts are well received, there are plans for focusing attention upon mission needs and opportunities right here in Delaware, on a subsequent Sunday.





A PASTORAL LETTER: to the congregation -

Dear friends,

Last Sunday's Lesson (March 16) was in part a discussion of healing and health in light of the resurrection. I had not originally planned to get into this but I found myself drawn in this direction and assumed it was the leading of the Holy Spirit. Your response has confirmed my conviction that I was guided.

Jesus tied all his promises to our obedience, the nature of which we have misunderstood for almost 2000 years. We usually say that to repent is to obey, but metanoia, the Greek word we mistranslate "repentance," literally means to change our minds; or, to put it a better way, to achieve a new state of consciousness. This is not accomplished by gritting our teeth and buckling down to a hard job. It is in quietness, reflection, imagination, responsiveness, that we find the Kingdom of God (abundance) which is within us. The name of the game is MEDITATION.

MIRACLES HAPPEN WHEN YOU GIVE A HAND

On Sunday, May 4, we will join with other churches in an act of compassion know as ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING. In this one hour we can help relieve hunger, heal disease, give hope, dispel despair. 

BOB STEPHENSON SELECTED BY HONOR SOCIETY



THIRD ANNUAL RETREAT SCHEDULED

Our third annual church retreat, scheduled for Sept. 5, 6, & 7, is in its final planning phase. The Rev. Norman Armstrong, former pastor of the 1st Baptist Church of Springfield, Ohio, and now director of the city's Neighborhood Church Clinic, will lead us. We will again travel to Camp Ohio for a weekend of spiritual enrichment, fellowship, and relaxation in the surroundings of a beautiful Ohio area.

7:00pm with an organized fellowship time followed at 8 with a session by Norman. Family stunt night is our traditional Saturday evening starting event. Departure time is Sunday afternoon with lunch the last scheduled activity. We will provide separate activities for the younger children so that parents may be a part of our study sessions. The hours between Friday evening and Sunday noon will be filled with varied features and you will come away feeling closer to Gcd and your fellow church members.

A TRIP TO EUROPE

The main reason for going to Europe this summer was to attend the Baptist World Congress in Stockholm, July 8-13. We went by Icelandic Air leaving New York on July 2 at about 10pm, arriving in Iceland at around 2:30am. It was daylight and about 42 degrees, cold and windy. We got off the plane both going and coming at Iceland as the crew was changed at that time. The airport was a bleak, dreary, flat place, the terminal more like a duty free port, probably because everything was housed in

one big building.

We arrived at Luxembourg next day about noon, found a room via the tourist bureau, took in a few sights, a tram ride, had dinner, and went to bed. Carolyn complained about so much noise and when we went to breakfast discovered that our room was over a Pub. That afternoon we went to Koln, visited the cathedral, and if you are not familiar with this type of architecture you should read about it. Fantastic! We took a city tour and one very interesting bit was that the city hall was built over an old Roman Praetorium and some of the foundation was left as excavated and is open for public viewing. Also several types of cement block was on display as well as other Roman artifacts. We spent 2 days there and I am still thinking about the \$1.35 I paid for coffee. Prices are very high in Koln.

We had a Eurail pass so that we did our traveling mostly by train. We met a variety of interesting people in our travels It took us about 24 hours on the train from Luxembourg to Stockholm. Money was quite a problem. First we had Luxembourg francs, then German marks, and then Dutch krones, then Swedish krones, and coming back we had Norwegian krones and French francs along with others. I was always fishing out the wrong currency.

We got to Stockholm about 7am Monday, July 7, and found our hotel, which was not too far from the railway station. Talk about public transportation, Stockholm has it: trains, huge subways, busses, boats taxis (these we stayed out of). We had to take a train each morning and back again in the evening to Eric-Massan, meeting place of the WBA, about a 10 minute ride. We explored the city on foot, we took some bus tours, went to the old town, very interesting, visited the old church, the palace, saw the changing of the guard, visited the famous town hall, the gold room where the Nobel prize winners are feted, took a boat trip to Drottingham Palace, the most interesting thing there was the Court Theatre which was built in 1789 and is still using the original equipment.

The first meeting of the Congress was Tuesday, July 8. The theme - "New People - New World - thru Jesus Christ." (2 Cor. 5:17) There were some hundred nations represented each appearing in native dress. The speakers stressed such ideas, Fellowship beyond Frontiers, Mutual Sharing, A Fellowship of Community Concern, No Racial Barriers, Human Rights, Relifious Liberty, etc.

We had morning, afternoon, and evening sessions with the last one on Sunday afternoon at Skansen Park with Billy Graham. We attended all but left Sunday afternoon besause we couldn't hear too well and went to see the ship 'Wasa."

There were several at the Congress that were on tour with us five years ago, so we had a rounion one day at lunch. I also saw Smiling Sam and Rev. K. C. George and had a very nice visit with Sam. Dr. Joe's tour group was at the hotel on the corner just below us. We saw him quite often and mombers of his group. We spent 9 days in Stockholm, 3 in Oslo, saw the Polar ship, the Fram and the Kon Tiki, Vegeland, Ski Lift, and Castle, etc.

We then went to Copenhagen for 3 days, visited the famous Tivoli Gardens, took a canal tour, and of course went to see the "Little Mermaid." Spent a day in Heidleberg, very interesting, went to Stuttgart for 2 days visiting Caroyln's relatives and then to Wildbad in the Black Forest, a spa and a delightful place, visited relatives for 2 days, it was a little difficult with very little English on their side and very little German on ours, but we had a lovely time.

Went by train to Luxembourg vis Strasbourg, France, had a layover of about 3 hours, so enroute to see the cathodral, up a narrow cobblestone street, we sat on a window ledge in front of a fur shop (Mighty hot that day!) and ate a delicious lunch which Carolyn's cousin had packed for us. All we lacked was the back pack.

Spent the night at Luxembourg and took a plane next day to New York.

THE LITTLE BROWN CHURCH IN THE VALE

1858

Romance is the word for the Little Brown Church

1975

Is there actually a Little Brown Church in existence today? Or is the name of the church fictional? Yes, there IS a Little Brown Church in the wildwood located near Nashua, a small town in Iowa.

William Pitts, a young music teacher, bumped along a dusty road in a stagecoach one hot day in June, 1857. He was on his way to visit his bride-to-be. Noontime came and the stage stopped at old Bradford to water the horses and give the passengers a chance to eat.

While waiting for the stage trip to Fredericksburg to continue, Pitts wandered around the countryside. One particular spot caught and held his fancy. The summer breeze sighing thru the ancient trees gave a serenity and charm to the scene. In his imagination, Pitts envisioned a beautiful, pastoral church set in the midst of the trees. The vision haunted him.

Of course the next few days, during the visit with his future bride, the scene was pushed into the background. But when he returned to his home in southern Wisconsin, the vision kept coming back to him. He wrote a poem describing the scene. words of "The Little Brown Church in the Vale" rang in his mind as he set them to music.

The years passed and the hymn lay in his desk drawer accumulating dust. Then Pitts returned to Bradford on horse back to teach music at the Bradford Academy. He was stunned by what he saw. A small church was being built at the very site he had visualized in the hymn. Church members had quarried rock for the foundation but the project had been delayed because of the Civil War. In 1864, the struggling pioneers who made up the congregation and contributed much of the logs, lumber, and stone, finally finished the building.

Thru the influence of Dr. John Todd, the gift of a bell was secured. The original inscription on the casting read, "Thomas Cole and Catherine his wife." Their gift still rings today. The bell was cast in the famous Meneely Foundry, Troy, N. Y., and was broken and recast in 1862. At this time this was the only church bell in Chickasaw County, and its coming was an event of wonder. It was rung almost continuously all the way from Dubuque until it reached

its destination. It still hangs in the tower and is beloved of all the countryside.

The edifice was dedicated Dec. 29, 1864. "And so we finished the building" are the words of the young pastor. On dedication day Pitts brought his singing class from the Academy to attend, and for the first time the song was sung in public. The church and Pitts' gospel song were soon one in the hearts and minds of the people.

A Chicago publisher heard the song and gave Pitts \$25.00 for the rights to publish it, and with the money Pitts embarked on a medical career in Chicago.. After finishing his schooling he returned to nearby Fredericksburg and set up practice.

Neither the song or the church gained much fame for several years. In fact there was a time that there were no services in the church; the yard grew thick with weeds and brush, the window lights were shot out and the whole scene presented a dilapidated and dismal picture of a shattered dream.

Bradford, as a thriving little village of over a thousand people, slipped into extinction when the railroad bypassed it.

Then came revival, thanks in large measure to the popular religious singing of Iowa's four Weatherwax brothers, performing at chautauquas and social gatherings all over the U.S.A. and Canada. They were known as the Charles City Quartet. They always ended their program by telling the story of the Little Brown Church and singing the song.

The song gained popularity, especially in rural areas, and now it appears in more than 20 different hymnals. It stands proudly in the class of such favorites as "The Old Rugged Cross" and "The Rock of Ages."

With the growing popularity of the song, couples of all denominations began to flock to the church to be married in its peaceful and charming rustic atmosphere. As many as 75,000 visitors pass thru its doors each year. Its denomination is Congregational.

Besides the church and a multitude of memories, all that is left of old Bradford is the Academy building, now a residence, some residences scattered around, and one of the best County museums in the state, the Chickasaw Museum.

Nashua is located on highway 218, 35 miles NW of Waterloo; or 45 miles SE of Mason City, between Waverly and Charles City. The LITTLE BROWN CHURCH IS ONE OF THE MOST VISITED TOURIST SPOTS IN ICWA, AND ONE OF THE MOST NOTED CHURCHES IN THE WORLD.

It is open from early morning until evening and YCU ARE ALWAYS WELCOME.

Sunday School 10am Worship Service 11am each Sunday

You will find posted on the bulletin board in the Assembly Room a booklet of the history of the Little Brown Church. You may browse thru this booklet at your leisure. You will also find three post cards giving information about the church. PLEASE DO NOT TAKE any of them away. There is also a folder showing a picture of the church.

Most of my life I have loved the hymn entitled "The Little Brown Church in the Wildwood or Vale." It reminds me of the church of my childhood, the Baptist Church by the side of the road, a brick church, built about 1835. The church and the cemetery was surrounded by forests of immense oaks, pines, huckleberry and chinquapin bushes. It is there today as it was then although many improvements and additions have been made.

You will find the hymn in our old Sunday School Hymnal, Hymns of Praise, No. 91.
