
Spring is the season of change, and summer is spring brought to its fullness. What is begun in spring unfolds and becomes the summer fruitfulness and joy.


EDITORIAL


Our Annual Church Family Retreat is coming up on September 5, 6 and 7 at Judson Hills.

On Christmas night.


There in that cold and barren field With golden voices they revealed God's marvelous plan: the Messiah's birth Bringing redemption to all the earth:

And all was light On Christmas night.


Between the earth and heaven that night
