

#### REPORT FROM THE TRUSTEES

The following is a report of Trustees' activities from late fall through March 1.

- 1. Phil Richert serviced our 8 gas furnaces. Work included new filters, oiling, testing of high-limit switches, and 3 new belts. One boiler was checked, water pump oiled, radiators bled off and 2 hot-water heaters checked.
- 2. The insulation project on the outside walls of the classrooms has been completed, with the Middler's Room being the final one finished in February. Many thanks to Dave Lovell for engineering this large project and to Jim Stephenson for his assistance, and thanks to the family that donated towards this.
- 3. The lawnmower was serviced for spring. A broken wheel was replaced, a new plug and fuel filter added, and the blade sharpened.

Note - the motor on this lawnmower was donated by Myrtle Smith. Repair work was done by Phil Richert at Buckeye Tractor.

- 4. The front doors were repaired with extra work on the hinges to remove the sag. The vertical lockrod was repaired and the doors now have clearance without binding. A bad spot in the floor at the Franklin House was repaired. This work was done by John Keefer, carpenter.
- 5. The spotlights over the stained glass window were replaced by Dave Lovell.
- 6. Delaware Glass Service replaced two broken windows in the new building.
- 7. The loose and peeling paint in the vestibule was scraped off and touched up by Peter White.
- 8. The fire department inspected our facilities during Christmas and said that we can no longer use live greens. An artificial tree has been donated, but we still need artificial greens for wreaths

and hanging.

9. Three pianos were tuned (Sanctuary, Sunday School Room, and Senior High Room). The action and keys were removed from the pianos in the Sunday School Room and Senior High Room and cleaned, tightened and adjusted. This work was done by Clifford Rector.

10. Pipe organ technicians Larry Williams and Gary Mason have returned three times since the big project last fall to make adjustments, minor repairs, and touch up tuning. However, the dryness of the winter season with the heat on has developed some cracks in the wood inside the organ. These cracks run between the holes that the pipes fit into in the chest, allowing the air to run toman incorrect pipe, creating a false sound. Only 3 are bad and it is hardly noticable. It will, of course, close up again in the summer humidity, and can be repaired that next time that major work is done. Last fall the bellows and tracker action were repaired.

Many projects face us as we move towards Steve's retirement. Trustee Fred Grubbs has volunteered to turn the heat on Saturday nights, open up Sunday mornings and lock up and turn off everything after Sunday services. Bulletins for Sundays and the newsletter will need a volunteer coordinator and typist. These large jobs will have to be done during the Interim Pastor's time of service, until we see what the new pastor's duties will be. The bulletin board must be changed and the hymn board in the Sanctuary changed.

I feel we need to create a new elected office - that of church secretary. Duties would include coming to church twice a week to get the mail and distribute it to the appropriate people, coordinate bulletin and newsletter production, and answer mail.

#### A HISTORY OF THE CHURCH'S PIANOS

All of our pianos have come to our church as gifts or donations, and I thought it might be interesting to put down as many details as could be remembered.

LOCATION - Sunday School Assembly Room
MAKE - Colby; Erie, Pennsylvania
YEAR BUILT - 1914

This piano is one of the two that have always been in the church and is perhaps the best one of all. Donor unknown.

LOCATION - Sanctuary

MAKE - Lyon & Healy; Chicago, Ill.

YEAR BUILT - late 20's or early 30's

This piano was purchased by Helen Young in memory of Edgar Ebenhack, who was church organist from 1948-1963. It was formerly in the home of Ethel Wagner on Montrose Avenue. Previously it was owned by Alden Fox, a local barber.

LOCATION - Senior High Room

MAKE - Richmond; Richmond, Ind.

YEAR BUILT - 1903

This piano was donated by Nellie Dick shortly before she left her home on West William Street. When it was placed in the Senior High Room, an older piano, a Kroeger, built about 1898, was taken apart and disposed of since it was in such bad condition. And yes, Fred Grubbs, it was

#### the old Kroeger that had 4 pedals!

LOCATION - Fellowship Hall MAKE - A.B. Chase

YEAR BUILT - 1902

This piano was purchased by Janet Dickey, teacher at Conger School and member of Grace Methodist Church, in memory of her father, Art Birdsell, who attended our church many years. He was a plumber and one of Delaware's colorful individuals. The piano was obtained from Mr. Rector, the piano tuner, specifically for the Fellowship Hall when the building was new.

The A.B. Chase was one of the best of the old piano builders. The one in the Fellowship Hall has a sostenuto pedal (the ability to sustain any certain selected notes while others are being played but not sustained, a feature usually found only on grand pianos).

LOCATION - Classroom on the right side of the hallway (north side)

MAKE - Langdon; Cleveland, Ohio YEAR BUILT - about 1895

This piano is one of the 2 originals. Donor unknown. It was located in the Junior High Room before the new building was built.

LOCATION - Second classroom on the left (south) side of the hallway

MAKE - Wellington

YEAR BUILT - about 1895

This piano was donated to help furnish a classroom when the new building was finished.

We have not been able to remember who gave this piano to the church. Can anyone help us remember? A committee of of 3 went to see it at the time - Wick, Ruth Brown, and Steve.

Information was obtained from the Pierce Piano Atlas using the piano's serial numbers.







#### WELCOME CHAPLAIN MILLER

Last Sunday Chaplain Jim Miller began serving as our interim pastor.

Chaplain Miller was born and raised in Lima, Ohio. He attended Ohio Northern University and graduated from Wittenberg College and Hamma Divinity School in Springfield (where he met his wife, Jane).

After graduation, he served as pastor for two years at the Lutheran church in Marysville. Then, from 1945-47 he served as an army chaplain.

In 1947 he left the army and became pastor of the Lutheran Church in Covington, Ohio, and then served as the associate pastor in a large church in Cleveland.

Chaplain Miller returned to the army in 1949, where he stayed for 3 years.

In 1951 he became pastor of a Lutheran Church in Cincinnati. Shortly thereafter he changed to the Methodist denomination, and served as an army chaplain from 1951-72.

While in the army he had 5 overseas assignments (3 in the orient and 2 in Europe).

After leaving the army in 1972 he served as pastor in a Methodist church in Columbus for 2 years.

In 1974 he and his wife moved to Indianapolis, where he studied to become a chaplain in the Clinical Pastoral Education Program.

In 1975 he became chaplain at Grady Hospital in Delaware, where he worked until his retirement in August, 1986.

All of us at First Baptist extend our heartfelt welcome to Chaplain Miller, and look forward to his guidance and friendship during the upcoming months.

#### TRUSTEES REPORT

One of the largest jobs in sometime was finished last week when the new roof was completed on the "new" part of the church building at a cost of \$ 3,046.00. The trustees saved up for this by not doing any large jobs last year.

When the new building was built it had a flat roof that leaked badly. After 6 years of efforts to stop the leaks to no avail, John Richards, who was then chairman, organized the building of the peaked roof with overhanging eves in 1970 as the final solution. It was these 1970 shingles that needed renewing this year.

The job included new ventilators in the

attic on the rear brick wall, new valleys, white trim paint where necessary, vents and stacks painted, and new flashing. John Mansville shinges, which have a 25-year life and have the latest development in sticky seal-down tabs, were used. The same black color was used because it doesn't show the stains from the walnuts and various vents and stacks which tend to rust and streak down the roof.

Roof repairs were completed at the parsonage. Four damaged shingles were replaced on the 2nd floor that caused a leak in an upstairs closet. Flashing that had rusted around the chimney and where the roof meets the 2nd floor was painted and the gutters were releveled. This work was done by Larry Lathrop and crew. Larry took over his father Bill's business about 2 years ago.

Pipe organ technicians Larry Williams and Gary Mason came in May and tuned and serviced the organ as per the contract we signed last fall for annual maintenance.

The fire extinguishers were serviced and inspected. The gas company dug up and repaired the valve out front along the sidewalk. A new cord was purchased for the small coffee pot. Two jammmed curtain rods were repaired. The light was changed over the choir. Jeanne Ekelberry's Republican Women's Club met in the Fellowship Hall. and made a \$25 donation. Mary Lou Lovell's piano students gave a recital in the sanctuary with a turn-out of about 100 parents and friends.

Arch Trigg is in charge of the yard at the parsonage until such time as a new pastor moves in. Anyone willing to take a turn mowing, please call Arch.

Much thanks to Jim Stephenson for continuing to do the bulletins and newsletter as it is a large voluntary responsibility.

The pilot lights were turned off for the summer on all the furnaces.

The hot water heater will also be shut off unless something is to take place in the Fellowship Hall. The pilot lights cost \$7.00 a month to operate and we have 7 of them. The hot water heater costs about \$25.00 a month to keep warm. We came out under our gas budget and can make a big savings this summer.

Dave, Jerry and Ben will be in charge of painting at the parsonage while it is empty. Any "volunteers" please call these fellows.

The trustees, after a lengthy discussion at their last meeting, concluded that the pastor is entitled to a private study. We are looking into the posibility of creating a "working office" elsewhere that might include Pam's desk, the copying machine, file cabinets, office supplies, and other things now scattered about. This may take some time and await input from the new pastor.



Dear Karen

This month Haiti has hit the headlines with news of strikes, road blocks and violence in the streets. For us there has been a faw anxious momments as it made it difficult for our patients to arrive, but they soon found

other modes of travel, coming by foot paths or even wading the river to bring their sick ones into us. Needed medical supplies arrived just in the nick of time when we were almost out of I.V. fluids as our driver talked them into letting him through. So we were able to keep our doors open, and with the help of our loyal staff have continued to care for all the sick who arrive at our doors. We have had a busy time, with other clinics closed. We have even patched up a few bashed-in heads, and set some broken bones due to some of the fracas here. We are also seeing an increase in both typhoid and malaria.

Early morning devotions by the staff have been faithfully attended. One worker claimed that the "Lord put starch into her trembling knees" Our summer volunteers have cheered us by doing their best to lift the load. We are still short staffed in the clinic with no replacement for Dr. Steve but they often return early and everyone pitches in to help consult so that each evening we praise the Lord for safely finishing another day.

I would like to call your attention to a couple of new projects which we have added to our list of how we use your specific gifts. This month over 20 children were cared for at \$25.00/month in Foster Care Homes. This has been a boon for special care for the orphan or retarded child as the get more individual special care and afe no longer exposed to the disease prevelent at the hospital. Also we have been able to buy up needed provisions for feeding the children and those in-patients needing extra provisions. Over \$1,000 was paid out for 50 and 100 lb sacks of commeal, rice, bulgar catmeal and powdered skim milk, flour and beans for the hospital use. We were glad to have these provisions when the road and markets were closed. We hope that this will tide us over for several months. gift of Mullid bouclages



#### TRUSTEES REPORT

- 1. A new water heater was installed at the Franklin House after the old one was found to be leaking and beyond repair. This work was done by Phil Richert.
- 2. Delaware Glass replaced 3 broken windows in the basement of the church.
- 3. A new light was installed in the Sunday School Room over the adult class tables. It is in memory of Charles and Claudia Eliot, long-time members at First Baptist. It is a reproduction of an old "school house" light designed to go with the high ceilings and architecture. At the same time the three fixtures which hold the spotlights on the stained-glass windows were replaced. This work was done by electrician Mike Clark.
- 4. The gas furnace that heats the upstairs classrooms was tested using a carbon-monoxide device from the fire department and found to be ok. The Sunday last spring when the fumes were bad must have been unusual weather conditions or a down-draft that caused the problem. All furnaces were turned on for the first time and ran ok.
- 5. Two chimneys were cleaned out at the Franklin House. Last Tuesday evening Imperial Maintenance worked overtime until 6,30pm after it was discovered that the center chimney that handles the boiler had an inner row of bricks that had collapsed down into it, blocking the draft. This was resolved by cutting a hole in the side of the chimney in the attic and removing the ricks. The hole was cemented shut and the

chimney was cleaned out at the basement level. This chimney will have to be rebuilt sometime. The back chimney that handles the hot water heater had not been drawing well and was also cleaned out.

6. At press time Imperial Maintenance had also agreed to work on the "pigeon problem." A pigeon repellant will be applied to all ledges and stones on the steeple. This will cost at least \$300.00.

We have not received any of the bills for all the above-mentioned repairs but the trustees have used up about all funds available.

- 7. Dorothy Traylor has resigned as janitor because she is moving to Columbus. We will miss her many years of good service. She was always doing something extra beyond her contract with us. The trustees will start a search. Volunteers accepted. Dusting pews, floor under the pews and restrooms are most important on Friday or Saturday.
- 8. Larry Lathrop made repairs to the edge of the roof and gutter across the back of the parsonage to stop the dripping.
