TRIMMING THE CHURCH CHRISTMAS TREE

Some folks asked that I write down what the things were which the children and I put on our tree this Christmas, and what each thing meant. So here it is — I hope it will help you find new meaning in the decorations on your tree.

First the lights — because Jesus is the light of the world and because the heavens were filled with a great light when the angels came to the shepherds. The long strings of beads or tinsel which winds around the tree represent the long, lonely journey Mary and Joseph made to Bethlehem from Galilee.

We put on a blue ball, because He came to our world, and our astronauts now show us that from outer space, our world is a beautiful blue. Because He is Lord of the Universe and was there when all the worlds were created, we add more colored balls, sometimes oddly shaped ornaments, for the worlds we have yet to explore.

Next came the angels -- for angels told the shephers of His birth, as the shepherds watched their sheep. We added little fuzzy sheep, and candy canes to be the shepherd's crooks.

Then we added some birds --- to remind us that there were little birds who witnessed the birth. And we especially added the white dove, symbol of the Prince of Peace, and of the Holy Spirit. Now some fruit, to remind us that He cares for us, and takes care of all our needs. Add bells, to show our joy!

Now comes the symbols of the Magi, the Wisemen or Kings. We put stars on the tree, for the Star they followed, and we also put three gold crowns, symbols of the wisemen. They were difficult to find, and I keep them in a special place for the Church Christmas tree. At home, we have three tiny wisemen, each bearing a gift. The gifts under the tree are there because the Wisemen's gift to the Baby Jesus began our custom of giving gifts. Have you ever thought that the slippers you gave Aunt Minnie were in a way, given in honor of the Christ Child?

Pastor Gillin added an ornament which reminded us of the anniversary of our Baptist Missions. At home we have little angels on the tree that came from our mission in Haiti. Putting a symbol of our missions is the first of the ornaments that recalls for us that He wants a response to Him and His love. We put in place a handmade red velvet heart....imperfect like ours, but still something He wants very much for us to give to Him. We added reflectors to some of the lights, for He wants us to reflect His love and His teachings in our lives. Then the iciclesthey represent the coldness of our hearts....let's give that to Him, too. One more object, to tell of His gift to us----the greatest gift of all.

PANCAKE SUPPER



During a Daily Vacation Bible School a class of five-year-olds was interrupted by the arrival of a new person. This little boy had one arm missing. The teacher had no opportunity to learn anything about him; he simply arrived and was there. As an adult, the teacher was nervous, worried that one of the children would comment on this boy's handicap and possibly embarrass him. There was no way to caution the class members so she proceeded as carefully as possible.

Soon closing time came. Nothing had gone amiss and the teacher began to relax. She asked the children to join in their usual closing activity. "Let's build our churches," she said, "Here's the church and here's the steeple, open it up and here's..." Suddenly, the awful truth of these actions struck her. The very thing she feared the children would do, she had done. The boy with one arm was excluded from a procedure requiring the use of two hands. As the teacher stood speechless, a little girl sitting next to the boy reached over with her left hand and placed it up against his right hand. "Here, Davey," she said, "Let's build the church together."

Two things are very important for Christians to do in inviting people to Christ: care enough to notice a person's needs and be a friend. Have you noticed anyone in need lately? What did you do about it? How many new friends did you make in anuary? These questions are directed to all of us at First Baptist. How far have we come toward becoming an inviting people? Think about it. At the end of this year, if each of us can say even one person came to Christ as a result of our testimony, our family of God will have doubled! Hallelujah! Let's get started during the season of Lent.



CHURCH GROWTH AND OUTREACH TASK FORCE REPORT

To date the task force has held two meetings, under the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Doug Hargis of Kenton, who has been specially trained in the church growth field.

We are working our way through a 205-page growth planning manual, an effort which will require 11 meetings over a sevenmonth period, concluding in March 1990. These training sessions will consume about 27 hours of intensive study. In addition there will be required homework for both the task force members and the whole congragation.

So far we have learned that "church growth" means different things to different people. The kindof growth we will be planning for has been defined as "the comprehensive and natural expansion that can and should be expected from the life and mission of the church as the people of God, the body of christ, and the fellowship of the Spirit." This concept goes far beyond any desire or effort to simply increase the size of our congregation. It means that our planning and action programs will encourage the growth of spiritual awareness, commitment and obedience to the calling of our Lord in individuals as well as the congregation, and should result in more significant ministries which will involve a growing number of persons.

We believe that honest, sustained growth will not happen by planning alone, no matter how well done. Planning does, however, allow for the proper preparation for effective ministry of God's plan for us through which real growth can take place in the life of our fellowship, and this is what we are about.

This effort by the task force on behalf of the whole congregation will need much prayerful support. We have the faith that with such support something good is going to happen!

ALL I EVER REALLY NEEDED TO KNOW I LEARNED IN KINDERGARTEN

Most of what I really need to know about how to live, and what to do, and how to be, I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate school mountain, but here in the sandbox at nursery school.

These are the things I learned: Share everything. Play fair. Don't hit people. Put things back where you found them. Clean up your own mess. Don't take things that aren't yours. Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody. Wash your hands before you Flush. Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you. Live a balanced life. Learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.

Take a nap every afternoon. When you go out into the world, watch for traffic, hold hands, and stick together. Be aware of wonder. Remember the little seed in the plastic cup. The roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seed in the plastic cup--they all die. So do we.

And then remember the book about Dick and Jane and the first word you learned, the biggest word of all: LOVE. Everything you need to know is in there somewhere. The Golden Rule and love and basic sanitation, ecology and politics and sane living.

Think of what a better world it would be if we all—the whole world—had cookies and milk about 3 o'clock every afternoon and then lay down with our blankets for a nap. Or if we had a basic policy in our nation and other nations to always put things back where we found them and clean up our own messes. And it is still true, no matter how old you are, when you go out into the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together.







PASTORGRAPHS

I spent the early part of my life in "deer country." The founding fathers had named the community Hartland in recognition of the rich bounty of game they found there each fall.

Every year, before hunting season, they would take their guns out to see if they were sighted in. Some would fire a box of shells at a target to see if the shot was going where it was aimed. They were careful to check the sights to make sure the gun was on target.

Occasionally it is good for us to check our aim here at First Baptist. There are several things that we would like to do. Most of them we would like to do right now. Patience can come a forgotten word.

kight now we need to check our aim. We cannot do everything at once. There cannot be a lot of talk about the need for renewal without any definite action. What do you really feel is the most important thing we should be doing at this time in our churchlife? Our church leadership thinks the most important responsibility is in church growth. We Are coming to a new acceptance of our responsibility of presenting the message of Christ. There can be a deadening within the Church when we turn inward to all our needs. The aim has to be on evangelism. The goal is Church Growth. That is the target not just adding names to a church roll, but a compassion to share Jesus and an expectancy that people need what we have in our relationship in Christ. First Baptist leaders are responding to the challenge to grow again.

John Donne said, "No man is an island."
Yet, don't you know someone who is desperately trying to prove that he needs only himself? Perhaps he or she is a close relive or friend. Maybe you've wanted to

rite that person to taste the fuller life Christ offers. As you do you contribute to the excitement of First Baptist Church as the family of God, the body of Christ and the fellowship of the Spirit.

REPORT FROM DEACONS

The Deacons authorized a schedule change for the Worship Hour this Fall with Sunday School beginning at 9:15 a.m. and Worship at 11 a.m. This provided a half-hour between Sunday School and Church for the following purposes:

- 1) Provide adequate time for choir tune-up





IN THE COMPANY OF SAINTS

Today I made a visit to the home of a couple, both in their eighties, who live in a remote area of the state. Their rented ancient farm house is literally falling down around them. The stone chimney fell down this summer and the fireplace has been filled in with plywood to keep the cold air from blowing into the living room. The upper floor is closed off and they live in a first floor area which consists of a kitchen, small hallway, and small bedroom. The only heat in the house is from a wood-burning kitchen stove and an oil heater. They do not have the money to put oil in their storage tank for the winter.

This couple suffered several personal tragedies in their lives, and have lived in modest surroundings with little evidence of material blessing. In spite of that, they radiate warmth and kindness, and give evidence of deep and genuine Christian faith.

Their total monthly income is slightly over \$400. Yet, each week, when they bake bread, they share some with a widow nearby who has no income.

As I left the hospitality of their kitchen table and walked down the broken steps through the falling front gate, I felt that I had been in the company of saints. They will leave few material goods behind them, but they are two of the richest persons I have met in years.

An M & M Visitor filed this report in requesting financial assistance in order to provide winter fuel for two worthy recipients of the RETIRED MINISTERS AND MISSIONARIES OFFERING.

In the month of December we shall once again have the opportunity to say "thank you" to those like our Pastor Stephenson who have served so faithfully among us. It will gladden our hearts to be able to say "thank you" to so many friends who have blessed our lives and the lives of countless others in our American Baptist family.


