Welcome to 1992! Every year at this time, I enjoy reflecting on my favorite part of the Christmas Story; the part about the wise men, the Magi, who came to visit the baby Jesus. "...they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road."

What is so amazing about this story is that these Magi chose to go back to their own country by another road. At first glance this may seem like the most insignificant part of the story, but it is really quite astonishing.

As we will recall, the Magi had been sent by Herod to find the baby, then report back to him. And, as far as we know, they were getting ready to do just that, when they had a dream which warned nem not to go back to Herod. This is the most amazing thing: that they listened to the dream. It would have been so easy for them to do what was expected of them, to go back home along the same road that they had traveled on before.

It must have been the baby. When they saw the baby, they believed, and they worshiped him. They knew that this was indeed, Emmanuel, God with us. They could have gone back by the old familiar road, but decided that they would not. Now, after all that had happened, it was impossible for them to go back; their lives had been changed too much, they understood too much and their lives were filled with such great joy; they could not return to Herod.

We find ourselves at the beginning of a new year. Like the Magi, we too have a choice to make. We can go home by the old familiar road; the one that we know so well. Or, we can open ourselves up to the possibility of taking a new road, taking different directions, and being open to the challenges that this new year may bring.

Our hope each Christmas is that the experience of the birth of the Christ child into our lives will change us. That through the grace of the baby Jesus, we can see our lives in a new light.

This is my prayer, that the power of this season may become real in life of our church and give us the strength to love and serve the Lord.

"The Pastoral Relations Committee will be composed of five people elected at large from the congregation.





The American Red Cross is now scheduling classes for 1992. Each class will be 8 hours long, or both can be completed in 12 hours.



- 6. The furnaces were serviced by Don Patrick and in December he rebuilt a water valve in the mens' oom.

- 7. The front doors were refinished.
- 8. The plaster was repaired and the paint touchedup in the assembly room, sanctuary, and both vestibules.
- 9. Cabinets were repaired under the sink at both the church and the parsonage.
- 10. Broken floor tiles were replaced at the church.


America for Christ Offering

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epent, for the Kingdom of God is near!"
These words of John the Baptizer ring loudly in my ear as we approach Lent. Repentance. As a word, it is somewhat outdated and old-fashioned; we just don't use it very much these days. Why? Well, for one thing, we just don't understand it. It is too strong. It causes us to want to enter Lent running as fast as we can with our arms shielded over our heads. Every year at Lent, when we finally do force ourselves to look repentance square in the face, we are confronted with harsh judgements which cause us to see the reality of our sinfulness. And quite frankly, we could do without it.

So we soften Lent by saying that it is a time of meditation and deep reflection. This approach is alright only if we are clear about the object of this meditation and deep reflection, that is, our sinfulness. It needs to be a time for asking ourselves the very serious question: What are the ways in which we have alienated ourselves from God, from our self, from other people and from creation? We may not always like the answers we receive, but that's what repentance is all about. Afterall, the goal of repentance is healing and wholeness; seeking to be reconciled to those feelings, emotions, dreams and people that we have separated ourselves from. Ultimately, Lent is about striving and working for a renewal of life for all of the relationships in our life.

Entering Lent is difficult work. Sometimes we will and must face it alone, and other times we will approach it with each other. May we be reminded that Lent is a turning from all that has separated us from God, so that God will be able to reach out to us. It is only then that we will be able to accept the new life of the resurrection which will be ours at Easter.

So, as we enter the challenging time of Lent, together, I give you these words of hope: "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is near!"

Cynthia Bland's Book Traces the Development of Latin Grammar

Dear Friends at First Baptist Church,

Several of you have asked me what my recently published book is about. Here is a description of its contents; in case anyone would like to look at the thing itself, I have placed a copy on the table under the mailboxes, and will leave it there during the month of March.

"On July 29, 1982, while engaged in research on Middle English grammars of Latin, I discovered in the Bodleian Library (Oxford, England) two such grammars which had neither been catalogued nor edited. For several centuries they had remained hidden in the binding of Lincoln College MS Lat. 129E, a fifteenth-century schoolmaster's compilation which I had requested to see because it contained English sentences with their Latin translations. When I asked for the manuscript, it had to be brought up from the conservation department by special permission. The reason soon became clear. Upon opening the protective box, I found what looked like a thin scrapbook Inderneath the leatherbound manuscript. Written in pencil on the scrapbook's white cover was a shelfmark, Lincoln College MS Lat. 130, and a note stating that this "fascicule" contained manuscript fragments which had been removed from the binding of MS 129 and quite recently pasted in MS 130."

My book, The Teaching of Grammar in Late Medieval England: An Edition, with Commentary, of Oxford,



"You're kidding! You count S.A.T.s?"

Lincoln College MS Lat. 130, recently released by Colleagues Press (East Lansing, MI), opens with this paragraph, the story of my discovery of two grammars of Latin written in Middle English, the Accedence and the Regemina, grammars which shed light on the development of traditional English grammatical theory (and help to answer the question, "Why does English grammar seem so much like Latin grammar?"). Working on these materials was like solving a mystery, and the dissertation which was the first version of the book was surprisingly easy to write because the research was so much fun.

The grammars form part of a collection of schoolroom materials which I was able to identify as being from a school in Bristol, England, in the 1420s. Thomas Schort, a schoolmaster and priest, discarded and pasted together these materials to form cardboard, and used them to pad the leather binding of a manuscript (now Lincoln College MS Lat. 129) containing his teaching materials and personal papers. My book provides the first full description of Lincoln College MS 130, the fascicule containing the complete collection of the binding fragments.

In the book, I trace the development of the teaching methods and linguistic theories that shaped the presentation of Latin grammar in the Accedence and the Regemina, and discuss their relevance to Middle English literature. The Accedence, a description and explanation of the parts of speech, is an English version of Aelius Donatuss Ars Minor, the standard elementary grammar of Latin from c.500-c.1500 A.D. Students who studied this Accedence text would have gone on to memorize Donatus's original version. The Regemina (Regimen), attributed at the end of the text to one Master Wacfilde, concerns syntax - sentence structure - and describes the parts of speech in certain grammatical constructions as governing (ruling) other parts of speech. For example, a verb is said to govern its object in the accusative case ex vi transicionis (by force of transition). The term ex vi transicionis was used in a famous grammatical metaphor by William Langland in his book-length fourteenthcentury poem Piers Plowman. The discovery of the Regemina written in English in MS Lat. 130 helps to show that the terminology of regimen is not as obscure as scholars had previously thought, and that Langland was not being purposely abstruse in creating a metaphor from one of the terms.

As you can see, this book won't make the bestseller list, but I'm proud of it anyway. Many thanks to all of you for your interest, your moral support and your prayers during times that I was frantically working on this project.



How An Eight-Year-Old Sees God

A church newsletter included this essay by Danny Dutton, age 8. His third grade Sunday School teacher had asked her students to explain God.

Clergy Salaries Surveyed

According to a new study by *Christianity Today* magazine, clergy salaries are not keeping pace with inflation. Over the past three years clergy salaries rose an average of only 7.4%, less than half the inflation rate of 16%. Total clergy compensation (salary plus benefits) rose 12.6%, reflecting higher insurance premiums.

More than 40% of the pastors at single-pastor churches feel that they are underpaid.

Some church officials blame the recession, saying that it has had a domino effect on churches and non-profit organizations. According to a study of 29 Protestant denominations, church members give an average of 2.6% of their noome to their churches. Twenty years ago the average was over 3%.



Many other books and papers were also found, including early records of the Women's Aid Society. In future newsletters we will publish further information from this first record book.

ast week, while on vacation, I was visiting friends who live in Schenectady, New York, about one hour from Bennington, Vermont. One evening we decided to be adventurous and drive to Bennington to take in the scenery, walk around town and have dinner. On the way there, I was looking out my window taking in the beautiful countryside, when I noticed a house on the side of the road, which had a sign

on it that read: "Antiques and Old Stuff."

I immediately thought to myself, now which sign would I rather have hangng around my neck, one that says "Antique" or one that says "Old Stuff?" I've always thought it would be better to be an antique, because antiques are valuable possessions, we spend lots of money for them, we collect them and display

them so that everyone can see them, and we take very good care of them. Old stuff, on the other hand, isn't worth much, sometimes isn't very attractive, has scratches, is often worn out, and usually gets shoved into a closet, the basement, the attic, or just gets thrown away.

One qualification of an antique is that it must be 100 years old or older. Our church is almost 140 years old, yet we do not call it antique, we call it an old church. Last week, I visited the very first Baptist Church in New Jersey, which is over 300 years old, yet the people there do not refer to it as antique; it is named "Old First Church." I know of people who are over 100 years old, yet we do not call them antique, we call them old.

I still value things that are antique, but I have begun to e old stuff in a new light. If something is old and we naven't thrown it out, it must be worth something to us; it must be valuable. That it is worn out and doesn't have much monetary value only means that it has been wellused and well-loved. If it wasn't important to us, would we keep it around?

I remember my sister Lori's stuffed animal Henry. Lori held on to Henry by the nose, and he followed her absolutely everywhere for the first five years of her life. During that time, he went through at least three noses. When he was finally retired, he was dirty and ragged and worn out and old. But, he wasn't just thrown out with all

> the other trash. You see, Henry is very valuable to Lori and even to our familv. We all have sentimental and emotional bonds with this ordinary stuffed animal. In fact, him in our family photo albums.





A.B.C. of the U.S.A.: General Board Votes on Homosexuality Issue

The General Board of the American Baptist Church met at Green Lake Conference Center from June 18 - 23. On June 22, after 3 hours of fervent but polite debate, the resolution on homosexuality that found "no Scriptural endorsement of the practice of homosexuality" was failed by a vote of 88 yes, 91 no and 2 abstentions. The resolution was not accepted by the board.

Pastor Brummett has copies of all the documents having to do with this issue, including a copy of the original resolution, the final resolution, a response from Dan Weiss, General Secretary of the A.B.C. of the U.S.A., and a response from Bob Fisher, Executive Minister of the A.B.C. of Ohio. You are encouraged to read through these documents as many of them are too lengthy and complicated to reproduce in a newsletter.

Trustees Report

If you thought you hadn't seen a trustee's column for a while, you are right. Jim has had so much for the newsletter that we were giving him a break. Ha, not really.

However, last year's expenditures were so large that we took it easy to allow the funds to build back up.

Our largest projects this summer have been:

- ♦ Asphalt coating was applied on all the standing-seam metal roofs, which are on the old parsonage, the two old back classrooms (the Junior High and choir rooms), and the storage shed. Total cost was \$1,200.
- ♦ A new sewer line was installed in the old parsonage from the upstairs to the basement. Total cost was \$798.

- ♦ As the newsletter went to press we suffered another broken window. The repair cost is unknown at this time. A firm like Franklin Art Glass will have to do the work.

Minor repairs so far this year have included:

- ◆ Furnace repairs
- ◆ Plumbing repairs
- Copier maintenance and repairs

More plumbing repairs and furnace maintenance will be done this fall.

Several gifts were gratefully received earlier in the year. "Thank you" to the folks who made these projects possible:

- ◆ The front yard was treated for weeds and fertilized twice.
- ◆ Four of the Delaware chairs were re-caned.

We also extend our thanks to:

- ◆ Jim Stephenson, for flowers, yard work and pruning at the parsonage and the flowers at church.
- ◆ Jeff Reed, who is doing some door painting at the parsonage.

And some other news:

- ◆ With all the rain this summer, mowing has been necessary almost weekly at the church, and the bushes and shrubs were trimmed twice by your reporter.
- ◆ The janitor's hours were increased by one hour per week.



Choir Orders New Robes

In 1964, members of the First Baptist Church choir decided to raise funds for new choir robes. (Can anyone remember the color of those robes?)

I was part of that committee and we held bake sales, car washes and had a "penny collection." We received individual contributions from church members (which ranged from \$5.00 to \$25.00) and group contributions from Sunday School classes, B.Y.F., and the Womens' Society.

We raised a total of \$360.15 and bought 20 robes and stoles. They were worn for the first time on Easter Sunday, 1965.

In 1989 we started again to raise money for new



robes – with ice cream socials, "In Memory" contributions and personal contributions - and have ordered 20 more robes and stoles. They will be delivered by the end of October. The big difference in 27 years will be the cost. The new robes cost \$1,728.

Thanks to all of you who contributed, and a reminder that memorial contributions can be made in memory of Rev. Stephenson, W.C. Wickum, Dick Lee or any others for whom you wish to contribute.

(By the way, the robes before 1965 were black.)

So we hear again the words of that little angel: "Hey, have I got news for you!" And we hear the challenge that comes each year with the approach of Christmas: the


