The Wise Ones still travel, though not quite so elegantly, the standing camel having lost its back leg and the sitting camel having lost one ear.

However, gifts intact, they are ready to move.

The shepherds, walking or kneeling, sometimes confused with Joseph (who wears the same dull brown), tumble forth, followed by three sheep.

There they are again, not a grand set surely, but one the children (and now the grandchildren) can touch and move about to re-enact that silent night.

When the others return, we will wind the music box on the back of the stable and light the Advent candles and go once more to Bethlehem.

And this year, when it's time to pack the figures away, we'll be more careful that the Peace and Goodwill are not also boxed for another year.

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

We continue our look at First Baptist's Declaration of Faith, as adopted in 1853. To review, the church chose to use the 16 "Articles of Faith" as published in the Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge as the basis of their faith. This month we present articles 12, 13 and 14:

12. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

That Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Spirit; to show faith in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Savior, with its purifying power; that it is pre-requisite to the privilege of a Church relation and the Lord's supper, in which the member of the church by the use of the bread and the wine are to commemorate the dying love of Christ; preceded by the solemn self-examination.

13. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

That the first day of the week is the Lord's day, or Christian Sabbath; and it is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labour and recreations; by a devout observance of all the means of grace both private and public; and by preparation for that Rest which remaineth for the People of God.

14. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

That civil government is of divine appointment for the interests and good order of human society and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored and obeyed, except in things opposed to the Lord Jesus Christ who is the only Lord of conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

Note: These passages contain several words which are today spelled differently than they appear in this text. We have transcribed them as they appear in the original church journal kept by James Eaton.


- Clayton Fogle, Will Fogle's brother, died on Saturday, January 22. The funeral was on Tuesday, January 25, in New London, Ohio.


Trustees' Notes

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

OCTOBER, 1853

e conclude our look at First Baptist's Articles of Faith, as adopted in 1853, with articles 15 and 16.

15. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

That there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and sanctified by the spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitent and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

16. OF THE WORLD TO COME

That the end of the world is approaching; that at the last day, Christ will descend from heaven and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn seperation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to enliss punishment and the righteous to enliss Joy, and that this Judgement will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell on principles of righteousness.

Seeing men that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of

person ought ye to be in all holy conversation and Godliness looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God?

Notes: In Article 15, impenitent means "unrepenting." In Article 16, we can only guess that "enliss" is a form of "enlist," i.e. to obtain or engage in.

We hope that you have enjoyed reading the Articles of Faith, for they provide an interesting insight into the basis of the beliefs that established First Baptist as a congregation. While the words and writing style may have changed, the underlying beliefs are timeless, and an important part of our basis of faith in 1994.

Next month we will begin a review of the Church Covenant, which was adopted in August of 1853.

Surveys on **Church Attendance**

Two recent surveys on church attendance reached very different conclusions.

According to a recent Gallop Poll, 40% of the people interviewed said that they attended a church or synagogue during the previous seven days. Other conclusions of the Gallop Poll are as follows:

- · Attendance is highest in the south and midwest, areas traditionally known as the "Bible belt."
- Women outnumber men at services by a ratio of 43% to 38%.
- College-educated persons are slightly more likely to attend than those who didn't attend college.
- By income, high-income persons are least likely to attend.

- By race, Black adults are more likely to attend than white adults.
- By age, people are more likely to attend as they grow older.

However, a different survey concluded that many people claim they are attending church when, in fact, they do not. This survey, in which actual church attendance was counted, concluded that only about half of the people who claim that they attend church actually do so, and that only about 20% of Americans attend services on a given week.

> others. And so that is what we try to do. We work each day and week and year, in our meeting and worshiping with each other in the presence of God, to become the kind of community that loves the way God loves.


Community is not a part-time thing; we have to work at it all the time. We don't need community only in times of struggle, but also in times of joy and celebration,



AUGUST, 1853

e continue our look at the history of First Baptist
Delaware this month with a review of our Church Covenant. It is assumed that the covenant was the work of several people since no authorship is claimed in the church records. It was adopted on August 6, 1853 during dedication services.

ORIGINAL CHURCH COVENANT

Having been, as we trust, brought by divine grace to the Lord Jesus Christ and to give up ourselves wholly to him; we do now solemnly and joyfully covenant with each other to walk together in Him with brotherly love, to his glory as our common Lord.

We do therefore in his strength engage:

That we will exercise a mutual care as members one of another to promote the growth of the whole body, to sustain knowledge, Holiness and comfort; to the end that we may stand perfect and complete in all the will of God.

That to promote and secure this object we will uphold the public worship of God and the Ordinances of his house; and hold constant communion with each other therein; that we will cheerfully contribute of our property for the support of the poor and for the maintenance of a faithful ministry of the gospel among us.

That we will not omit closet and family religion at home; nor allow ourselves in the too common neglect of the great duty of religiously training up our children and those under our care, with a view to the service of Christ, and the enjoyment of heaven.

That we will walk circumspectly in the world that we may win their souls, remembering that God hath not given us the spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind; that we are the light of the world and the salt of the earth, and that a city set on a hill cannot be hid.

That we will frequently exhort, and if the occasion shall require, admonish one another according to Matthew 18 in the spirit of meekness, considering ourselves lest we also be tempted, and that as in baptism we have been buried with Christ, and raised again, so there is on us a special obligation thenceforth to walk in newness of life.

And may the God of peace, who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great shepherd of the sheep thru the blood of the everlasting covenant, make us perfect in every good work to do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, thru Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

and the little boy wasn't very happy about having to get dressed up and go to church. His new shoes were too tight; his tie choked his neck and on top of that, the weather was too nice to be inside all day. He complained as loud as he could, "I don't know why we have to go to church on Easter anyway; they keep telling the same old story and it always comes out the same in the end."

Good question. If it's such a familiar story, and we know what's going to happen at the end; why do we bother to keep telling it and listening to it?

It's no secret that I like to go to the movies. (Some may even argue that "like" is an understatement.) But, not everyone knows that I like to see movies more than one time. And, if I'm deeply touched by the movie, I'll see it again and again and again. (I stopped counting after ten on *The Sound of Music.*)

I'm not sure of all the reasons why I re-watch movies, but two important ones come to mind. First of all, I believe that when we see a movie the second time around, we get more out of it and we catch things we didn't get the first time. Secondly, when I feel personally touched by the characters and drawn into the story of the movie, I like to see it again to figure out where and what those connections are; this gives me insight into who I am and my hopes and dreams for my life.

These are good reasons for going to church on Easter. It's very possible that in the exasperating grind of day-to-day life, we lose sight of who we are, and our hopes and dreams become more than a little bit fuzzy. We begin to believe that the way of the world is the way of life. And if nothing else, hearing this same old story jolts us out

of our complacent acceptance of the same old world and the same old life. But the hope is that in listening to and experiencing the same old story, we will hear something new.

We come to church this Easter morning, hoping and praying that our lives will be touched in a new and different way. We come with the expectation that the story of resurrection will bring new life to us and to our world.

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

AUGUST 6, 1853

Recognition services had no sooner ended on this date before the newly formed First Baptist Church of Delaware got down to business—literally. The Rev. E. G. Wood called the first business meeting to order, and the congregation went about choosing which association it would join.

It was the choice of the membership to join the Columbus Baptist Association, where it would remain until 1913. It was in that year that Mt. Vernon and the Mad River Association persuaded Delaware, with an "urgent" request, to follow them and help form the Marion Association.

First Baptist remained in the Marion Association until August 5, 1928, when on the 75th anniversary of the church it voted to ask for reinstatement in the Columbus Association.

We would stay in the Columbus Association until the late 1950s, when a realignment of state associations took place. Delaware was asked to approve, and accepted, a move back to the Marion Association, where we remain today.



What about the Holy Spirit?

PENTECOST

It's May now, the Easter season is drawing to a close and we're getting ready to celebrate Pentecost. Otherwise known as the birthday of the church, Pentecost is the day we remember that the Holy Spirit is a gift from God, given to us so we can be God's people. We can't be the church

without the Holy Spirit. It's impossible. At some level. we understand this: but what we don't always understand, is what exactly is the Holy Spirit? It's a strange thing, and difficult to describe and understand. It's not like we can point to someone and say, see they have the Holy Spirit, you can see it hovering around their head. We have many

questions about the nature of the Holy Spirit: How do we know we have it? What does it feel like? Where do we find it?

Not long ago, I was listening to the news on the radio. Often they'll give little one-minute news scenarios; not of great importance, but usually interesting, unusual and often quite bizarre. This particular news bite was about a man who stopped at a gas station somewhere in Alaska, put gas in his car at a self-serve pump and then went inside to pay. Not that unusual. I do it at least once a week. But, as he was paying, the clerk asked him if he would please sit down. The man was

confused, but he did as he was asked. The clerk said, "Don't be alarmed, but you have a bullet hole in your head. Please sit still and I'll call an ambulance."

What a great story. The man had been shot in the head, and he was just casually going about his everyday

> business as if everything was normal. The bullet hole in his head didn't have an effect on his life until he was told about it.

I'm reminded of the Church. I can't help it, it's my job. We're often like this man. We've been given this great gift, the Holy Spirit, and we live our lives as if there's nothing unusual

about us, casually going about our everyday business as if everything is normal. But we aren't normal. We're like this man who's been shot in the head. God has breathed the Holy Spirit into our lives. It changes who we are; how we think and especially how we live our lives. The Holy Spirit is that force within us which marks us as belonging to God. It connects us with God so completely, that we can never be separated. As a result, we often find ourselves wondering what God wants us to do and how God wants us to treat other people. Sometimes we even find ourselves

loving others the way God would love them. It's an amazing thing.

Pentecost is an opportunity to remind ourselves that we aren't normal. Because of the Holy Spirit, we're different. It's easy to forget. Sometimes we'd just as soon be normal and ordinary. It's impossible. We're God's people.



SEPTEMBER 1853

t the regular monthly business meeting, the church welcomed two new families into the fellowship, and also set about putting their beliefs into writing in a series of resolutions.

"Brothers H.P. Havens and A. Prouty and sisters Havens and Prouty, their wives" were unanimously received as members. Mr. and Mrs. Havens were members of the Columbus Regular Baptist Church, and "desired the fellowship of this church."

The church's first two resolutions dealt with liquor. The first condemned "the manufacturer, sale or habitual use of intoxicating liquors" as "incompatible with the principles of the Gospel and inconsistent with the profession of Christianity."

The membership further resolved that it would not "receive to our membership nor hold in fellowship" members who engaged in the sale or use of intoxicating liquors "as a beverage."

The second resolution called for punishment for any member found guilty of violating the first resolution, stating any breach "shall be considered an offense worthy of Church discipline."

Jarrod Trigg



HISTORICAL **GLIMPSES**

Compiled by Barb and Rick Van Brimmer

OCTOBER 1853

To this point, the newly formed church had operated without a great deal of formal structure. At the October 1853 business meeting, still being held in the Templar Hall, officers were elected by the membership.

William Heath and Leonard Turner were selected as the first Deacons, James Eaton (who had recorded all the church history to this point) was elected clerk, and H.R. Havens was installed

as Treasurer.

The new congregation once again set about looking for a permanent home for First Baptist, and formed a committee of Rev. E.G. Wood, Eaton, and T. Griffith to "prepare and (distribute) subscription papers for the purpose of raising funds to build a meeting house in the Town of Delaware."

As was reported in a previous segment of Historical Glimpses, the congregation had secured the land where the present church now stands earlier in 1853.

July 3 — "Service in the Park"

On July 3, there will not be a morning worship service in our church. We have been invited to take part in an ecummenical service which will include about seven other churches within Delaware. Please join us at 10:00 a.m. as we gather at City Park on South Liberty Street.

The service will be led by "Hymns of Dixieland," a group of Jazz musicians from the Cleveland area. The service is composed of favorite gospel hymns which are presented along with the tradition and history of each hymn. There will be opportunities throughout the service for the congregation to sing along.

An offering will be taken during the service. All loose offering will go to help with expenses, and the offering in regular church envelops will go to the designated church. Because this is a regular Communion Sunday for our church, we will be celebrating Communion the following Sunday,

In case of rain the service will be held at the Chappelear Drama Center on Elizabeth Street.

As I think of summer and the tradition of vacation, I can't help thinking about my grandfather. Since his death in January, I think of him often. Lately, however, as I've pondered my need for relaxation, and a much needed reprieve from the telephone, his memory has been haunting my thoughts.

You see, Grandpa Bromo (short for Brummett) loved to work. The two most important things in his life were his family and his work. He quickly tired of time off, vacations, and trips. No sooner would

he get to his destination of leisure, than he'd be ready to go back home. He never retired. Fortunately, he was able to work with my dad, and so up until 2 weeks before his death at the age of 80, he worked at least a

little bit every day.

From time to time, after his health began to deteriorate and the battle against cancer was wearing him down, my dad would talk with Grandpa about retiring.

Grandpa insisted that he wanted to keep working. My dad, trying to convince him that retirement might be a good idea, asked Grandpa if what he wanted was for

his son (my dad) to come to work one day and find him slumped dead over one of his machines. My grandpa, in complete seriousness, replied that this would suit him just fine. He was happy when he was working. As I ponder these things, I realize that I'm grateful to my grandpa for many things; but most of all for his love of me and for his love of his work. I will always be thankful that he taught me the love of working hard and working well.

I don't mean to imply, by these reflections, that vacation is bad or isn't necessary. I really believe that vacation time is essential to our individual work and to our work as a community. However, we need to be careful not to

confuse vacation with escape. If we always feel as if we need to get away from our work, then we probably need to ask ourselves if we're doing the right kind of work. Now I do realize that some people have to work at their particular job in order to pay bills and provide for their family, and it may not be the exact job that they were planning on having when they first entered the work force. But I also realize that we have many other choices in the kind of volunteer work we choose to do. This includes, as you may have guessed, work within the

Church and work within the communi-

ty.

Whatever kinds of work we do, it's clear that work is physically, mentally, and spiritually draining. We need vacations. We need opportunities to be away from our work so we can gain vision about our future and be renewed with energy and enthusiasm for the work that we do. Vacation away from our work is actually part of our work.

As we take our times of vacations this summer, let us offer this prayer.

May we entrust our time away to the keeping of God. May God's wisdom and strength renew us for the work of life and the

work of ministry. May our time of rest and our time of work be always committed to the work of God's love. Amen.



HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

Compiled by Barb and Rick Van Brimmer

Throughout the early days of the church's history there are many references to the meetings and services being held at Templar Hall.

Church records indicate that rent was paid for the use of the building, about \$40 a year, and "subscriptions" — which we now commonly refer to as pledges — were needed to assure payment. Templar Hall served as a gathering place for First Baptist from 1853 until a permanent church building was erected on the present site in 1857.

Templar Hall, located on the west side of N. Sandusky St. between William and Winters Sts., was built by the Sons of Temperance in the mid-1850s. The Sons of Temperance advocated total abstinence from alcoholic beverages.

The building was a cross between Federal and Greek Revival architecture, and featured at least two store fronts on the first floor. The second and third floors were used for offices and/or lodge rooms. At one time, the upper level served as court facilities for Delaware County.

Templar Hall has undergone several remodelings through the years, but still remains very much a vital part of daily life in downtown Delaware — you might recognize it as the U.S. Store!

My parents are getting ready to move. The grand old house, which over the course of 20 years we somehow made into a home, has a "for sale" sign in the front yard. And we're all getting ready to say goodbye to this old friend. It's kind of sad. So. I've begun the process of remembering. Of looking back over the years to all the memories that this old house has brought me. They aren't all good ones, that's for sure, but they all belong to me and to my family in one way or another. These memories tell the story of who we have been and who we are.

As my mother is thinking about packing up all of the household possessions and moving them to a smaller house, she isn't looking forward to it. Apparently, neither am I. Fortunately, I don't take pictures for the sake of art, I take them for the sake of memory. I will remember this grand old house through the years and years of pictures that were taken. When we actually remembered to get the camera out and buy film, we recorded the events that were important to us: birthdays, holidays, graduations, a wedding, babies learning to crawl and walk, all kinds of pets doing the funny things pets do, proms, homecomings, picnics, family gatherings, and lots and lots of pictures of people doing crazy and even ordinary things. It really doesn't seem like 20 years have gone. The truth is in the pictures.

If you're waiting for the great theological truth of these reflections, there isn't one. I want only to reflect on the gift of memory, and how important it is not only for our past, but for our future. It's only by remembering who we were and were we've been, that we're able to imagine and envision the future. Memory is one of the great gifts God has given to us. As we look through our past and imagine our future, let us be thankful.

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

James Eaton

While he has never been formally recognized as the founder of First Baptist-Delaware, James Eaton was certainly the driving force behind the formation of our church. As we have discovered through the previous segments of Historical Glimpses, Eaton nearly single-handedly began the drive to establish a Regular Baptist church in Delaware in 1846.

It took nearly seven years, but Eaton's dream was realized in 1853, and his beautiful script recorded those early days in the church's first journal. The cracked, yellowed and fading journal is the only piece of early church records that survived both the advancing years and Delaware's disastrous flood of 1913.

Eaton and his family originally lived on a farm near Cheshire in Berlin Township, and moved to Delaware in 1828 on the birth of their son, Henry James Eaton. The elder Eaton served as the surveyor of Delaware County for many years, and was known for his meticulous attention to detail as evidenced in our early church records. After moving back to Cheshire some time later, the family returned to Delaware in 1844. Henry then entered Ohio Wesleyan and graduated in 1849, practicing law in Delaware with Col. William Reid until his death in 1903.

The Eaton family is commemorated by their gift of the stained glass window at the rear of the sanctuary. Custodians: Teresa and Mike Griffith put in many extra hours getting the church ready, being present each evening during peace camp, and staying afterwards to make sure the church was clean and ready for the next night.

Pastor Brummett Chairs Spiritual Life Committee

On the invitation of Executive Minister of the A.B.C. of Ohio, Dr. Robert Fisher, Pastor Brummett will be serving as the Spiritual Life Chairperson on the Steering Committee of the "Building on Common Ground" Campaign. This Steering Committee will be responsible for facilitating the A.B.C. of Ohio Capital Funds Campaign in an effort to raise between 1.2 and 1.5 million dollars over the next three to five years. The money raised will undergird our efforts to establish new churches, to provide capital improvement funds for our camping program, and to provide "venture capital" for outreach programs for A.B.C. churches in the region.

As Chairperson of the Spiritual Life Committee, Pastor Brummett will be responsible for convening a Committee consisting of laypeople representing churches throughout the A.B.C. of Ohio. The Spiritual Life Committee is responsible for bringing spiritual support to the "Building on Common Ground" Campaign throughout the Region. The committee will give recommendations to local churches about resources to be used for bringing spiritual support to the campaign. The committee will organize and promote a Region-wide prayer emphasis for the campaign.

The position will require Pastor Brummett to attend monthly meetings of the Steering Committee and to pull together a Spiritual Life Committee from across the Region which will probably have bi-monthly meetings.

As a result of taking this position, Pastor Brummett will resign from two of her positions within the denomination. She will no longer serve as president of the Marion Association Pastors and Minister's and Mates groups, and she will no longer serve as the Women in Ministry representative on the Minister's Council of the A.B.C. of Ohio.

Adult Inquirer's Class

Pastor Brummett will be teaching an Adult Inquirer's Class for the Fall quarter during the Sunday School hour. The class will provide new and not so new members and friends of First Baptist Church the opportunity to explore their own personal theological and spiritual beliefs, and to learn more about American Baptists, Baptists in general and First Baptist Church. The class will include two new elements, borrowed from the Youth Inquirer's Class: 1. Class members will have an opportunity to choose someone from the church to be their "Baptist Buddy." This will be a person they feel comfortable talking to about their faith journey. 2. HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

ne of the more interesting aspects of reading and researching our church's history has been the "phraseology" used to record and describe the early events. The English we speak today seems to lack the eloquence of our forefathers.

One phrase we see often in early church records is the practice of "renewing fellowship" before each business meeting. "Renewing fellowship" translated literally would mean bringing back together a group of people with similar interests or beliefs to share companionship and experiences. There is a certain romance to that description, and a feeling of importance about the custom.

Another phrase we see repeatedly is "a door was opened" to new members. There is such symbolism in that description, and such biblical importance — perhaps a reference to John 10:9 ("I am the door; by me if any man enter, he shall be saved..." KJV).

It's important to note not only our history, but the descriptions of that history and how it was recorded. That can be just as interesting and informative!

If you have documents, family histories, photographs or other historical data that concerns the church's history, please don't hesitate to share it with us. We would be especially interested in family history as it relates to church membership. This part of the church history is lacking in records that have survived the years. Photos are also scarce. Thank you!



For some divinely known reason, which I have yet to discover, I volunteered to be the Coordinator of the CROP Walk Committee. It has been an interesting and oddly fulfilling experience. (If you knew the members of the committee like I do, you'd know why I chose the word odd.) But all humor aside. I've been amazed at the enthusiasm and dedication of people on the committee, in the local churches and youth groups, and at the University. So far,

we have distributed about 500 sponsor forms. People are learning about the asking family, friends and neighbors

CROP Walk and they're going out and to sponsor them



when they walk. Some people are planning to walk. Those who are unable to walk are giving money to those who can walk. And still others are pledging money and walking.

The amazing thing to me, is that we're doing this for people we don't know, and probably never will know. People who are half-way around the world, in countries we've never seen and living in societies that are very different from our own. It's true that 25% of what our CROP Walk earns will come back to Delaware and be used by People in Need, but that leaves 75% which will go to fight hunger throughout the world. Our goal is \$7,000.00. If we meet this goal, it

P.I.N. and \$5,250.00 will go to the world. It's an incredible and amazing thought that we are going to do this.

The slogan for this year's CROP Walk is "We Walk Because They

> Walk." This sounds a little strange at first, but after pondering it's meaning, I've begun to realize that it's actually quite profound. People who live in situations of extreme poverty don't have a choice. They have to walk-lots. They have no cars or public transportation at their beck and call. If they want to get water, or food, or go to the doctor, or go to school, they have to walk sometimes miles and miles to get there. It's just life for them.

So I am thankful for my feet. I'm glad that I'll be able to go out this afternoon and walk 6 1/2 miles. Oh, my feet will probably swell

up and be sore for a few days. But, that's life. May this be our prayer: That God will abundantly bless our walking. That as we walk we will be connected, by God's spirit, to people in this community and to people throughout the world who must walk each and every day just to survive. May our gift be a gift of life and health. Amen.

APRIL, 1854

In church minutes from April of 1854, the subject of renewing Rev. E.G. Wood's association with First Baptist as pastor highlighted the business meeting. Rev. Wood was asked if he would continue on "as Pastor and Preacher" for the "sum of \$500, including what we shall get from the O.B. (Ohio Baptist) State Convention, said amount to include house rent."

Pastor Wood accepted the offer, and a committee was formed to "circulate subscription paper" to raise the salary. There is no indication what Rev. Wood's arrangement with the church had been during his first year as pastor.

The meeting concluded with a discussion regarding building a meeting hall within the coming year on the Franklin Street lot.

OOKING AROUND ME, I've noticed with a great deal of consternation, that the air has grown cold and the leaves have fallen from the trees. It's not that I don't like winter, it's just that the Fall kind of snuck up on me. Believe it or not, Thanksgiving is just around the corner.

What does it mean? Does it mean that we're supposed to give thanks for what we've been given? Or, does it mean that we're supposed to give as a way of being thankful? Or does it mean a little of both? Perhaps the best way to give thanks for all that we've been given is to give.

If you're like me, some things are much easier to give thanks for than others. Unexpected gifts are hard to receive. For example, I have no trouble thanking someone for a Christmas or Birthday present, because I've come to expect gifts on these occasions. But when someone offers to pay for my dinner or gives me a gift that I don't expect (such as a compliment), I have a little more difficulty being thankful. Not that I don't say thank you. I was taught to always say thank you. It's just that it takes more than a simple thank you to be thankful.

In order to be thankful for a gift, especially an intangible gift, we have to receive that gift. When we receive a gift, whatever it is, it becomes ours and it becomes a part of our lives. When we truly receive a gift, then we can respond to it.

Consider the Masai tribe in West Africa, who have an unusual way of saying thank you. When they express thanks, they bow, put their forehead on the ground, and say, "My head is in the dirt." When members of another African tribe want to express gratitude, they sit for a long time in front of the home of the person who they want to thank and literally say, "I sit on the ground before you."

These Africans understand well what thanksgiving is and why it's difficult for us: at its core, thanksgiving is an act of humility.

As we celebrate Thanksgiving, let us think about the many and different gifts that God gives to us. Especially

APRIL, 1856





Is The Church Costing Too Much?

Last Sunday, another golfer sank the last putt on the 18th green and received a check for \$50,000 for four rounds of golf, plus an automobile for himself and one for his wife. This week, the papers reported that a certain popular singer will receive \$100,000 per week for her current singing engagement. Americans spend annually more on dog food than on church contributions. It is not unusual for an individual to pay more for his country-club membership than he gives to the church. Is the church costing too much?

Let me share an experience with you. On June 2, 1940, a little girl was born to us. She cost us money from the moment she was born. As she grew from babyhood to girlhood, she cost even more — her dresses and shoes were more expensive, and we had to have the doctor through all those childhood diseases.

She was even more expensive during her school and teen years. She needed long dresses to go to parties. When she went to college we discovered, along with other parents, that all college expenses are not listed in the catalog. After graduation, she fell in love and married. She was married in a church wedding, and that, too, cost a lot of money.

Then, five months after her marriage, she suddenly sickened, and within a week she was dead. She hasn't cost us a penny since the day we walked away from her grave.

As long as the church is alive, she will cost money. And the more alive a church is, the more money she will cost. Only a dead church, like a dead child, is no longer expensive.



Back in October, I clipped an article out of the Delaware Gazette; maybe you saw it. It happened in Fostoria, Ohio. About 10 years ago, people saw the silhouette of Jesus on the side of a soy bean tank. It wasn't a poster. It wasn't painted there. As best as they could tell, it wasn't done with mirrors and lights. Somehow, it was really and truly an image of Jesus. It attracted national attention, and people from all over went to Fostoria to see if they were able to see Jesus.

Back in 1986 when the Image of Jesus face first appeared, thousands of people gathered to see Jesus. On one night, two of the 75 to 100 onlookers saw it. Most saw nothing. However, the traffic continued to back up for at least a mile each night. One day, when traffic was particularly heavy, the newspaper reported that 2 accidents had almost happened since sundown and a young boy was almost hit while crossing the street.

Apparently, it's happened again. Someone claims that Jesus has returned to the soy bean tank; and the people are flocking to Fostoria, once again, to see if they can catch a glimpse of the man from Nazareth.

Perhaps I should take events like this more seriously, but the cynic in me thinks it's downright crazy. Why do people put so much energy in looking for Jesus in the extraordinary? Of all the places in the world Jesus could choose to show up, why would he pick a soy bean tank in Fostoria? Good question.

Perhaps we look too hard to find Jesus. Maybe it's just not that difficult. Maybe he's been right in front of us all along. Instead of searching the skies and peering into the sides of buildings to catch sight of the Holy, maybe we could learn to look around at the people and situations that need our care and concern. These are the places where Jesus is present. Not in the extraordinary. Not in

the phenomenal. But in the ordinary lives of people who need to be loved and people who need to give love.

This is Advent. A time of waiting. A time of preparing. We prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus into our world so long ago. And, at the same time, we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus into our world

Jesus' presence in our world is a reality. This can make Advent a scary time, because it's a time when God calls us to get ready to receive the life of Christ into our lives. When we receive this life, we'll be transformed. It's a promise. We'll look at the world through new eves. We'll see life through the


