




Please join us as we prepare our hearts and minds for Lent—as we join together in this season of prayer and reflection.

## Declaration on Nuclear Non-Proliferation

The American Baptist General Board met in semiannual sessions on December 1–4 in Philadelphia. They unanimously passed a "Declaration on an Issue of Importance: The Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty."

Noting that the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, which "has been a cornerstone for the global effort to halt the spread of nuclear weapons," expires in 1995, the Declaration urges American Baptists "to advocate and pray for" its renewal. # Good News Letter

Try to listen to what people say to me. And in my listening, throughout the past year or so, I've heard several people say the same thing. And I'm not just talking about people in our church, because I've heard this same quote from all kinds and types of people. It goes something like this: "I shouldn't complain or worry about my

in the form of an answer to any of these questions. I just don't know. What I do know is that there is a lot of suffering in the world. Suffering Happens. It won't make a great bumper sticker, but it's certainly true. But I do know, that the answer is not to deny our own suffering in light of the even more terrible sufferings of

others. I tend to think that denying our own suffering only makes things worse. When we say that our own suffering isn't important, then we deny that it has happened. And when we deny that we have suffered, then we actually bury a part of our own

very valuable experience. We actually bury a part of our self. And in a very real sense, we're really pretending to be something that we're not. By denying our own suffering, we also proclaim that we are our own person, in charge of our own life and are capable of overcoming any obstacles put in front of us. With this kind of strength of character what do we need with other people; what do we need with God?

Suffering just is. I tend to believe that it takes a great deal of faith, courage and strength of character to accept our suffering—to admit to ourselves that we have suffered and that it was bad. Accepting suffering is the only way to get through suffering. If



troubles, after all there are so many people in the world who suffer and have much greater troubles than I do."

This is my reply. Suffering can't be compared. Suffering just is.

It's Lent once again, and so it's appropriate to talk about difficult topics such as suffering. There seem to be so many unanswered and unanswerable questions surrounding the problem of suffering. Why do people suffer? Who causes suffering? Or should it be, what causes suffering? Why does God allow suffering? Why do bad things happen to good people and good things happen to bad people? Why is there evil in the world anyway? These are the deep, dark questions of our faith that never seem to be answered to our satisfaction. The problem of suffering is perhaps the single most difficult dilemma of those who believe in God.

I'm sorry to say, that I'm not here to finally impart great wisdom and truth

you don't believe me, read the story of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection.

Suffering is real. It is one of the few things that all people have in common. And the one thing that makes the times of suffering in life bearable, is not the knowledge that it's making us a better or stronger person, but the knowledge and faith that we never have to suffer alone. This, to me, is one of God's most merciful promises.

During this season of Lent, as we reflect on the terrible suffering of people throughout the world, as we look at and accept our own suffering, and as we begin to understand the ways in which God shares in our sufferings, let us pray for the courage to face the whole of our life experiences, offering all that we are to God who promises never to leave us or forsake us.

significant milestone was passed by First Baptist in February, 1995, with the retiring of the mortgage of the Congress Court parsonage. The \$22,000 note was retired in 17 years.

The purchase of the new parsonage at 632 Congress Court came about after the death of longtime member Pauline Nash in 1976. Miss Nash willed her North Liberty Street home to the church to be used as a parsonage, to replace the aging structure on Franklin Street. It was the decision of the church members that the home was not suitable for that purpose, and in keeping with the spirit of her gift, sold the property for about \$35,000 and applied the proceeds toward the construction of a new home.

The Congress Court site was selected shortly thereafter, and construction of the home began in 1977 at a cost of \$57,000. Rev. James B. Stephenson and his family were the first to occupy the new parsonage.

The old parsonage (located next to the church at 93 North Franklin Street), which the Stephenson's had occupied for 30 years, has served as a rental property since 1978.

## **Andrews House Update**

In January, the renovation of the house proceeded primarily in the hands of contractors who installed the electricity and plumbing & heating and fire prevention & security systems. The target date for the completion of this work and occupancy of the first floor is March 1. The work of volunteers has continued, but at a slower pace while these mechanical systems are being completed. The pace will quicken again as soon as rooms become ready for decorating.

Formal agreements are being made with those Partners who will use the first floor for their programs or offices. These Partners include: Big Brothers/Big Sisters; Action for Children; the Association for Retarded Citizens; and the Willis Before-School Program. Still other groups will be scheduling meetings in the assembly spaces.

The Andrews House Board is very busy developing policies and programs; its committees are working hard and well. Looking toward the uses of the second floor, the Board is reviewing requests from additional groups, and has begun study to develop its own program initiative concerning housing needs of youth.

The capital funds campaign committee is being reconstituted, to include members of the Andrews House Board and the community at large, in preparation for a community-wide effort.

The Cooperating Churches have grown to twelve; they are giving more and more energy and time to the overall needs of the enterprise, at the same time as their members are increasingly giving volunteer work.

For those wishing to volunteer, workers are needed on most Tuesday evenings and Saturdays. Please see Beth Trigg, our Andrew's House Representative if you are interested in volunteering or in finding out more about Andrews House.

## Letter ood news I

wish I could tell you that I thoroughly read the daily newspaper because I'm a concerned, patriotic and civic-minded citizen. But, alas, I must confess, that the articles I do read in the newspaper depend upon whether or not I'm attracted to the headline. I suppose you could say that I'm a discriminating reader. When I want to find out what going on in the political world, I listen to the radio. When I want to find out if anyone in

the church has been taken to the hospital, or if anyone has died, I read the newspaper. Other than that, the main reason I read the newspaper is for entertainment: the comics, the puzzles, and the human interest stories. I

especially like the human interest stories, because I find they appeal to the preacher in me. I came across one such story in last week's Delaware Gazette, and I've been mulling it over in my mind ever since. I might add here, that as a result of this manner of skimming through the newspaper, I believe I have a rather warped view of the world. Perhaps that is one of the qualities of a good preacher.

Anyway, I think this article carries a valuable message about human nature. And after all, we are in the season of Lent, which will lead us to Easter, and so it's quite appropriate to speak about human nature.

There's a new game out among elementary school children. It's called "Pogs." It started in Hawaii in 1992 and got it's name from the abbreviation P-O-G on the caps of a popular Hawaiian drink containing passion fruit, orange and guava. "The rules are simple: each player has some pogssmall thin discs usually made of ally made of plastic, called a slammer. The pogs are stacked up and a player throws the slammer on it, and the pogs that flip over are 'won."

At face value, nothing is wrong with this game: it's harmless, innocent fun. But that's where human nature comes into play. Evidently, this game has become highly competitive. Children no longer use ordinary bottle caps and

paper—or caps and a heavier disc, usu-



pieces of paper, but our capitalist society has found it necessary to manufacture specialized Pog sets. Now they are quite fancy, sporting designs from cartoon and movie characters to peace symbols, and costing up to \$7.00. The real problem, is that this has become a high stakes game, with children playing to win these caps, some of which are quite valuable (at least they're valuable by ten year old standards). And as far as the schools are concerned, the game has become quite disruptive, causing some ugly fights among children in our nations elementary schools. "Schools around the nation are finding it easier to ban Pogs than spend hours straightening out fights over who won the game and if students were really playing for 'keepsies.'"

O.K., I'll ask the inevitable question. What is the world coming to?

Well, I guess we've been there for a long time, and this is just a very vivid reminder of our sinful nature. There's

no doubt that we're in trouble; that we need help from some power other than ourselves; when our children so successfully act out our human failings. They've learned so well, and at such an early age, to take something which is innocent and fun and to turn it into something corrupt and harmful. We have only ourselves to blame. We could blame our society and our culture for corrupting us, but after all, in order to be corrupted, we must first be open

to the possibility of corruption.

So, here we are. It is such a vivid example to me, of where we can go if we keep trying to go without the wisdom. guidance and life of God.

Thank goodness for Lent, a time

when we can honestly look our human nature right in the face and accept it for what it is. And in the midst of looking at ourselves as we really are, warts and all, we're even more thankful for the gift of Easter. A reminder to us, that when we will finally admit to ourselves and to each other that we can't do it all on our own, that we are human, and that we do need God, that God doesn't let us down. God offers us a gift that will overcome even our human nature. May we accept that gift of life that God offers to us in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, and may that life make our lives whole, healthy and alive. Amen.



Tell, I've finally done it. I took the plunge. I bit the bullet. You may know, I've talked about it now for the past three summers, but it's never amounted to very much. Now, finally, it's been done. I decided to have a garden: complete with tomatoes, car-

rots, lettuce, beans and a whole host of healthy garden-type vegetables. I picked out just the right spot, the plot has been tilled, and now I'm waiting for the frost-free date to pass so I can start planting.

I also took another plunge. I've been wanting to take now for quite some time. Somehow, I just never had the time or the money. But, now seems like the right time. So I've done it. I took the plunge. I bit the bullet.

You probably know by now, that I've decided to go to Guatemala this summer. I'm going on a Habitat for Humanity International Workcamp with a group of thirteen people from Delaware (including myself, my sisters Lori and Karen and Natalie Mowery). While there, we will be building houses with a group of people in a Guatemalan community.

So, I thought I would take some time to tell you about the trip and why I'm going. The first question you might want to ask is: What do planting a garden and going to Guatemala have to do with one another? What's the connection?

I think what fascinates me about plants, is the very basic fact that they grow. It is amazing to me that you can put this little, tiny seed in a cup of dirt, put it in the sun, water it, and a plant will come out of it. Tomatoes are my favorite. The seed is so small and flat and ugly, yet it grows up into such a

large, beautiful, earthy-smelling plant that bears this wonderful red fruit that I love to eat. I suppose that I like the idea of growing tomatoes, because the process is cyclical. You start with a seed, then you have a plant which bears a fruit, which has seeds, which you can

then plant in the ground and start all over again.

It seems to me that this is what being a part of the community of God's people is all about. We're called and brought together as a community; we

learn to love one another; we learn and grow together. And eventually, we feel the urge to move beyond this community and out into the

larger community of
God's people in our
local community, our

nation and the world. The Church is called to be open to the free and creative leading of the Holy Spirit. It's what it's all about. In other words, once the seed of faith is planted, we can never be sure where it will grow. Afterall, that's what makes it fun.

I decided to go to Guatemala for many reasons. The most important, is that I feel it is a practical way that our church can participate in ministry and mission in a part of the world that isn't known to us. And, it's sponsored by Habitat for Humanity which is a ministry that's very well known to us and which we're active in in our own local community. So, it seems like a logical connection.

I thank you for having the faith to take this journey with us. It's my hope that it will be a learning experience for all of us, and that it will encourage and nourish us as we grow closer to one another, closer to the people we serve and minister with, and closer to God. May the God who loves and creates all life, grant us wisdom and strength, that as we plant and nurture and grow, we will do so with a spirit of grace and love.



Also, in the interest of decreasing the number, and thus the time, of new concerns, that as many of the concerns as possible be submitted to the pastor in writing before the start of the service.

Let us repeat that we recognize this as a valued part of the morning worship service and in no way wish to discourage anyone from expressing their joys and concerns but cooperation with these suggestions will, we hope, make the morning prayer period more meaningful.

## **DISCIPLE Bible Study**

Our church is hoping to take part in a new Bible study called DISCIPLE. Please read the following article to find out what it's all about and how you can become involved:

The title DISCIPLE includes both identity and purpose. The disciple is a learner, believer, follower, proclaimer. In the Bible the word disciple is connected with instruction and training.

Underlying the development of DIS-CIPLE is the assumption that people are hungry for the word of God, for fellowship in prayer and study, and for a sense of appropriate ministry as baptized, believing, committed Christians. Therefore, the purpose of DISCIPLE is to develop strong Christian leaders through regular in-depth study of Scripture. Disciple making and Christian nurturing are its goals. The purpose of DISCIPLE can be summarized in the words of Ephesians 4:12: "to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ.

DISCIPLE assumes that the Bible is the key to renewal in the church.

DISCIPLE recognizes the humandivine nature of the Bible: The actual texts of Scripture were written by human beings like ourselves in their cultural settings, under the divine inspiration of God.

DISCIPLE gives Old and New Testaments equal time, emphasizing the wholeness of the Bible as the revelation of God.

DISCIPLE aims at transformation, not just information.

DISCIPLE calls on people to submit themselves to examination by Scripture, to put themselves under the power of God's word, and to be changed by God's word.

DISCIPLE invites people to bring their experiences and struggles to Scripture.

DISCIPLE uses biblical language and biblical images.

DISCIPLE draws upon the work of scholars to aid understanding of the Bible.

DISCIPLE requires reading large portions of Scripture each week.

DISCIPLE features group discussion of Scripture based on careful study and preparation.

During the course of thirty-four weeks, DISCIPLE study groups will move through the biblical story from Creation to the New Jerusalem (Genesis to Revelation). The titles of the sessions along with theme words; theme verses: and major people, events, and topics will fix the sequence of the biblical story in the minds of the participants. The principal Scripture for each session follows the chronological movement of the biblical story. Each week, a major theme helps the group grow in understanding the Bible. And each session is greatly enhanced by a 10-minute video presentation by pastors, teachers and scholars.

The DISCIPLE Bible Study at First Baptist will begin in September of 1995. We will meet each Monday evening for 2-1/2 hours from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Each member of the group will be asked to bring \$2.00 to each of the 34 meetings, which will help to pay for the cost of the DISCIPLE materials.

Please come to the DISCIPLE information meeting, which will be held after church on Sunday, May 21 in the Assembly Room. The meeting will last for one half hour. We will be joined by members of the DISCIPLE Bible Study from Grace United Methodist Church. They have just completed DISCIPLE and will be available to tell you about their experience and what they have gained from this adventure in Bible study.





# **Good News Letter**

Published in the Cause of the Abundant Life by the First Baptist Church, 101 North Franklin Street, Delaware, Ohio 43015; (614) 363-7021

There are two kinds of guilt. Bad and good. First the bad. I start with the bad, because we in the Church have this one pretty well down to an exact science. This is the kind of guilt that's motivated by shame. It goes something like this. "If you don't do this, then you aren't a good person." This is how it works: if you don't live up to the expectations that are put before you by your parents, your friends, your God, yourself and everybody else, then you should feel bad. You've fallen short. You're not the kind of person that you should be. Notice that the language of this kind of guilt is filled with the word should. This kind of guilt is directly linked to our sense of self worth.

Have you ever noticed how benevolence is often connected to shame-motivated guilt. You should do good things for others, give to the poor, donate your money to charity, because look at how much you have and look at how little they have. Then comes the kicker. Because, if you don't do good, give or donate, then it's expected that you should feel bad about yourself. The problem with this, is that our main reason for good behavior is to prevent ourselves from feeling like miserable, worthless, unlovable worms.

Does any of this sound familiar? Are you as tired of this kind of guilt as I am? Bring on the good guilt!

But, how can there be such a thing as good guilt? Isn't that an oxymoron? Actually, good guilt is nothing more or less than a healthy, realistic and honest understanding of how things are as compared to how things could become. Let me



explain.

As you know, I leave for the country of Guatemala on July 5. Guatemala is bordered by Mexico in the north and west, Honduras and El Salvador in the southeast. and Belize in the east. Look at an atlas to get an idea of where this is in relation to Ohio. I'm going there with 11 others on a Habitat for Humanity International Work Camp. While there, we'll be staying in San Juan de la Laguna, a small Tzutuhil village on the Southeast shore of Lake Atitlan in the Department of Solola. The villagers are almost entirely members of the Tzutuhil tribe, speaking Spanish as well as their own dialect. We will work with the villagers to build homes.

Why am I going? Because I feel guilty. I'm serious. However, I believe that my actions are motivated by a strong dose of the good variety of guilt.

To help you understand, let me tell you what I know about the history of the Guatemalan people. The old Mayan empire flourished in what is today Guatemala for over 1,000 years before the arrival of the Spanish. Guatemala was a

Spanish colony from 1524-1821. was briefly a part of Mexico and then of the U.S. of Central America. The republic of Guatemala was established in 1839. Since 1945 when a liberal government was elected to replace a longterm dictatorship, the country has been struggling towards socialism, had an armed revolt, renewed attempts at social reforms, a military coup, and, in 1986, civilian rule. In recent history, political changes occurred when the democratically-elected president dismissed the constitutional government and was then replaced by human rights director, Ramiro de Leon Caprio, the current Head of State. Continuing political and economic issues keep resources undeveloped and the population trapped in rural poverty.

So, I feel guilty. Why? Because I have a good life. I live in a very wealthy country, where I enjoy many rights and privileges and have all the things that I need and more than enough of the things that I want. I have a beautiful home, with indoor plumbing, electricity, heat, air conditioning, telephone, television, vcr, refrigerator, cooking appliances galore, and all the comforts of the modern life. Compared with the people of Guatemala, I have everything and they have nothing. So, I feel guilty. The difference between good guilt and bad guilt, is how I interpret these feelings of guilt. Do they motivate me to feel bad about myself as a person, which doesn't really accomplish anything, or do they motivate me to take part in some kind of productive and lifegiving action?

God calls us to love our neigh-

bors as we love ourselves. This is the formula for good guilt. Because God loves me and gives life to me, I want to give that love and life to others. As long as others are denied love and life, such as the people of Guatemala and so many others in our world, then we are denied love and life. So we are called to respond. And it's not really a matter of feeling bad about ourselves when we don't respond, because as those who believe and have received the love and life of God, we are compelled to respond. It's just part of who we are. We can't help it.

So we go to Guatemala, and other places in our community and in our world, to share the love and life of God, and God's blessing takes us there and gives us strength.

# **Good News Letter**

Sometimes being a preacher is a pain in the neck. Or perhaps a more accurate way to say it is that sometimes being a preacher is a pain in the conscience. Whatever you call it, I often wish that I could escape it. But alas, being called to preach the Gospel is something like having one of those large birthmarks that everyone pretends not to notice, but is next to impossible to ignore.

Preaching is primarily an act of prayer and faith. It's an act of prayer because it represents this amazing three-way communication between God, the people and the preacher. It's an act of faith because the preacher and the people, and ultimately God, must hope and trust that the words of the preacher and the response of the people will be and become spirit-filled. So, you can see that it's quite a responsibility, and not just for the preacher, but for everyone involved. This means you.



Being a preacher is a real pain, because once you become a preacher, once you take the fatal plunge, you're a preacher for life. It's like a disease. Of course, I would never use hyperbole, but it seems like everywhere I go and everything I do goes through my preacher's eye and ear. In other words I have the habit of looking at everything through the screen of the Gospel. So, please induldge me as I ask you to look at what I saw after my recent trip to Guatemala.

On July 19, at 5:30 a.m. I was in Guatemala City, at the airport, getting ready to return to the states after my 2 week work camp with Habitat for Humanity. I arrived home at 6:00 p.m. Then, on July 20, at 12:00 p.m., I traveled to Worthington, Ohio to attend a training seminar for the DISCIPLE Bible Study. It's kind of like traveling from the slums of Los Angeles to Beverly Hills in the same day. I literally went from a country where I never saw a television or radio, rarely saw carpeting or a refrigerator, didn't have hot showers, couldn't drink the water or eat fresh vegetables, and where the only telephones around were community phones where you had to pay to make a collect call; I went from this to a city in our country where I spent two nights in what seemed and really was a very plush and luxurious Holiday Inn, complete with wall-to-wall carpeting, elevators, hot showers, coffee pot in the room, a huge king-size bed, air conditioning, and exotic food with fresh steamed vegetables and a crisp salad, and water with ice cubes. So, the preacher in me is compelled to ask the question,

What's wrong with this picture?

On Friday of the seminar, I spent the afternoon catching up on my reading assignment for the evening's session. I read the entire Gospel of Matthew. And I read this passage: And behold, a rich young man came up to Jesus, saying, 'Teacher, what good deed must I do, to have eternal life?' And Jesus said to him, 'Why do you ask me about what is good? One there is who is good. If you would enter life, keep the commandments.' . . . The young man said to him, 'All these I have observed; what do I still lack?' Jesus said to him, 'If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me.' When the young man heard this he went away sorrowful; for he had great possessions.


These are the times when I dread being a preacher, because it's impossible to read this passage of Scripture (or any passage from Scripture) without asking myself what it means for my life and what it means for the lives of believers everywhere.

What I know is this, we are a wealthy country. We have far more than we need and almost everything that we want. I am overwhelmed by the excess I see around me in my own house and everywhere I look. And the thing that keeps coming back to me, is the Gospels, and the knowledge that somehow my having all of this excess denies the bare necessities of life to someone else. Do I have

an answer? Do I think we should sell all of our possessions and give the money to the poor? Am I willing to sell all of my possessions? Can a person have so much and still be a Christian?

I just don't know. What does keep coming back to me, however, is that old bumber sticker that says, "Live Simply so that others may Simply Live." Perhaps it's not a bad idea to take stock, re-assess, from time to time, and just cut back. Get rid of the things that we really don't need. Easier said than done, I know, but I don't see what other choice we have.

As we consider the hard calling of the Gospel Life, let us pray that God will give us a heart for life, and that we won't just walk away sorrowful because we have many possessions, but that we'll confront the hard questions, keep asking them, and try to listen as God gives us the answers. May we have the faith to accept the answers we receive and the courage to live them. Amen.

**DISCIPLE:** Becoming Disciples through Bible Study is an approach to Bible Study that emphasizes disciplined reading of and listening to Scripture. It results in biblically nourished persons committed to live as disciples. During the course of 34 weeks, DISCIPLE groups move through the Scriptures from Genesis to Revelation. All DIS-CIPLE Bible study participants will read more than 70 percent of the Bible. The Scripture for each session follows the chronological movement of the biblical story. DISCIPLE groups consist of twelve members and a leader and meet weekly for 2 1/2 hours for a period of 34 weeks (nine months). Each participant makes a commitment to daily preparation (30-45 minutes per day) and weekly attendance at and full participation in the group study sessions. DIS-CIPLE aims at transformation, not just information. DISCIPLE calls on persons to submit themselves to examination by Scripture, to put themselves under the power of God's word, and to be changed by God's word.





# Good News Letter

ne of the many good things about being a pastor, is that I receive newsletters from many different churches. Not only does our church receive newsletters from churches in Delaware and churches in the Marion Association, but I receive newsletters from all the churches I've ever attended or served and from the churches of all of my friends who are pastors. That's a lot of newsletters. So, I get to read lots of articles, read many church-related cartoons and learn all sorts of interesting stuff. And, I also get to read lots of pastor's columns. You get only one guess as to which one I think is best.

The really great thing about getting all these newsletters, is that they become a very handy resource. In other words, I steal from them. On second thought, lets use the term borrow, it sounds less harsh.and certainly more biblical. In order to be proper and give credit where credit is due, I'll tell you that I borrowed the following thoughts from the "Old First Church Happenings" the Newsletter of Old First Church in Middletown, NJ. The pastors of the church Byron and Carolyne Breese, are friends from seminary, who probably "borrowed" these same thoughts from someone else's newsletter. It's a vicious cycle.

"There are two kinds of people in the church—Pillars and Caterpillars. The Pillars hold up the church and the Caterpillars simply go in and out."

When first hearing this quotation, we might presume it to mean that the Caterpillars are the bad guys and the Pillars are the good guys. Perhaps we need to re-think this presumption.

"Pillars don't change. They're made of stone. Sometimes people get so intent on holding up the church they

become too set in their ways. They support the church, but they forget about God, who is the One the church is all about. Perhaps they 'hold up' the church in another way and keep it from advancing."

"Caterpillars, on the other hand, are alive! As long as they keep 'going in and out' — 'in' to receive God's blessings and to worship and praise God and to pray...and 'out' to spread the good news in the world — they are moving and changing and becoming. And, we all know what happens to

Caterpillars — the 'Big Change,' which comes when they break out of the cocoon and become beautiful butterflies, and they lift their lovely wings."

"So, it goes both ways. The Pillars would profit by adding 'Cater' to their name, and breaking out of their stony shells. And the Caterpillars should remember that their last name is 'Pillar' and they had better do their share of the 'upholding' so that there will continue to be a church to go in and out of."

As the tradition of borrowing goes, the author of these profound thoughts is unknown. Never-the-less, these thoughts are helpful as we look into the future of our church, First Baptist, and even the Church of Jesus Christ. As we approach a new year, and plan for next year's church budget, we think about what our financial gift to God will be; and as we plan for God's ministry in the world, we think about who among us is gifted to serve in what capacity and about how we ourselves can

best serve God in this church, this community and in our world.

May we open ourselves to God's spirit, which moves within us and gives us the wisdom to know and understand both the "Cater" and the "Pillar" within ourselves and within each other.

#### Alaska... The "Last Frontier"

Several people have asked me to write an article for the newsletter about my trips to Alaska. I'll try not to bore you but hopefully you will pick up some hints on things to see in Alaska if you ever decide to make the trip to the "Last Frontier." It certainly helps to have a daughter (Jennifer) whose profession is being a travel consultant. With her help, and my love of researching and planning trips, it was a lot of fun.

There are many things to see in our 49th state that is 1/5 the size of the lower forty-eight states. With a population of approximately 550,000, there is an incredible amount of uninhabited and undeveloped land. On each trip I tried to plan on seeing different places.

Jennifer, Ed, and I drove from Fairbanks to Anchorage. This is about a 370 mile route traveling along the Alaska Range. We stayed at Denali

Princess Lodge and toured some of
Denali National Park. We were fortunate to have an excellent view
of Mt. McKinley, the highest
mountain in North America (23,320

mountain in North America (23,320 feet). It is only visible about 30% of the time, so consequently some visitors never do get to see its beauty. We drove south from Anchorage on the Seward Highway past Prince William Sound to the Portage Glacier Recreation Area. On this trip we saw moose, caribou, Canadian geese, and Dall sheep (no bears).

Each time I was there we tried to see things around the Fairbanks area as Eielson Air Force Base was just about twenty miles from Fairbanks. We visited Alaskaland, a pioneer theme park. The park contains a number of early 20th-century structures as well as the railroad car of President Warren G. Harding, Fairbanks has several Ohio connections as it was named for Charles Fairbanks, who attended Ohio Wesleyan University. We spent an evening at the Ester Gold Camp (one of Alaska's original gold mining towns) and saw a show in the Malemute Saloon that recounted the gold rush days in story and song and the poetry of Robert Service. We visited with people at the next table who were from Loudonville, Ohio (who had gone to high school with none other than the Delaware Gazette's Jesse Carter). Yes, it is a small world! We also saw "Photosymphony" — an audiovisual re-creation of the aurora borealis, or "northern lights." I did get to see the "northern lights" on two occasions on my last visit in September.

Other interesting things to do in Fairbanks include: a trip down the Chena River on the Riverboat Discovery (paddlewheel) and seeing the Iditarod Trail Race winner and her dogs; the University of Alaska museum; and, of course, a visit to nearby North Pole to see the home of Santa Claus, "Santaland."

Barrow (population 3,500) is the northern-most settlement in Alaska. It is 340 miles south of the Arctic Circle and can only be reached by air. It is one of the world's largest Eskimo settlements. Jennifer and I made this trip because it sounded "like a great adventure," which it was. We can say that we have been to the "top of the world." It was here that I

saw the most modern court building in Alaska and met the Clerk of the North Slope Court District, who took us down all the town's unpaved streets on a tour. The Post-Rogers Memorial in Barrow commemorates the deaths of Will Rogers and his pilot, Wiley Post, who were killed in a 1935 plane crash just twelve miles from their destination. On the air trip back to Fairbanks we went through Prudhoe Bay, the beginning of the Alaska Pipeline. We saw the pipeline up close as it runs through Eielson A.F.B.

On the most recent trip, Jennifer met me in Seattle and we took the Alaska Marine Highway (a ferry line run by the Alaska State government) from Bellingham, Washington, to Juneau, the state capital. We were at sea for almost three days and made stops at Ketchikan, Wrangell, and Petersburg before arriving at Juneau. This city is accessible only by air or by way of the Alaska Marine Highway. We saw the State Office Buildings and also met the Clerk of the Court System for Juneau. Juneau offered great shopping opportunities with many shops filled with native arts and crafts.



o be honest, I don't feel like writing an article this month. However, since many of you have informed me that last month's hiatus wasn't at all appreciated, I decided I'd better get to work. And let's face it, it is Advent after all and the season would be incomplete without the annual true meaning of Christmas lecture. So here it is.

I must admit, and this is quite unusual, that I'm having a difficult time getting into the Spirit of Christmas this year. But you know, the last few weeks have been tough.for all of us, individually and as a church family. We're struggling with the loss of our friend Will, and we're being supportive as others in our church family experience the death of friends and grandparents and endure some pretty difficult life struggles. And it seems that each new day brings the news of yet another tragedy or struggle. We're getting tired. I'm finding that the hope I usually wear as a strong, thick coat wrapped around my shoulders that keeps me warm and protected, is wearing thin and starting to get some rather large holes. I'm starting to feel a little hope-less.

As I racked my brain and heart trying to come up with some inspiring and hope-filled message to give you, I remembered something that Carol Sue said to me last week as we sat in the hospital. We were talking about the possibility that Will would still be in a coma during the holidays, and she asked me if I thought it would be wrong for her to have the Christmas Spirit. Of course its not wrong. If anything, we need the Christmas Spirit now more than ever. She answered her

own question of course, when she began to tell me how important Christmas had been in their marriage and to their family, and that she couldn't imagine not celebrating Christmas.

In the face of tragedy, our faith is always challenged. We feel bad, because try as we will, we still don't understand tragedy or death, and we're never really ready for it when it comes our way. It's even more diffi-

cult because we live in a society that sees death as the end of life; that believes death is a failure.

This is the only real hope I can give you this Christmas (or any Christmas): death is not the end of life. When we get caught up in the terrible struggle that tragedy brings our way, we

forget that life is at the very heart of the Christian Faith.

Remember Easter? The true spirit of Christmas is the hope of the resurrection, the promise of Easter, which is given to us in the birth of the baby Jesus on Christmas.

So I urge myself, and I urge you, to forget about mustering all the hope in the world, because it just won't help. The hope we receive, is a gift from God, and we receive it only when we celebrate Christmas. So I invite you to make just a little room in your struggling, hurting, questioning, and grieving heart, mind and

soul. And in that room, take time during the season of Advent, to prepare yourself for the gift of the Spirit of Christmas. It is our only hope.



In her mid-80s, Ellen Gezork of Vero Beach, Florida, still loves doing two things her father taught her when she was growing up in Germany: fishing and playing chess.
