

Winter Book Study: More than Welcome

The Board of Christian Education will be offering a thought provoking book study on the topic of Christianity and homosexuality. This ten week study will focus on the book More Than Welcome, written by First United Methodist Church minister Maurine C. Waun of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. This text is designed for use by churches seeking understanding of this controversial issue. The following review, written by Catholic Bishop Bill Peckenpaugh, can give you an idea of the book's tone:

"Author Maurine Waun opens with some personal background, which serves both to explain her personal interest in the topic, as well as to help the reader identify what is (and, as importantly, what is not) being asked of him. She covers some basic problems with the way the Bible has been used to justify hatred of 'sexual minorities.' Waun's knockout punch is the individual stories she presents, and this section was definitely the most painful for me. In six chapters, Waun recounts the stories of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered

people relating to pastors, churches, fellow parishioners, and their relatives and friends. It was in this section that I realized my 'understanding' of these people's situation had been shallow at best, and actively hurtful at worst. Over and over, the author lets the stories speak more forcefully than she could, identifying institutional and personal prejudice, bigotry, indifference, and apathy. It was difficult to read of these people of faith, trying to live out a call to follow Jesus as best they could, being repeatedly hurt and shunned by those who profess to love all their neighbors as Christ commanded.

Fortunately, Waun does not leave us with that alone. She goes on, in the third section, to identify specific problems the church [speaking as the universal Body of Christ] must address, and specific things individuals should consider when contemplating the Gospel call to 'love your neighbor.'

I highly recommend this book to all. The question isn't 'should we allow gays in the church?' They're there. The question is: how do we follow Jesus' teaching, and love those who are different from us? Waun does an excellent job presenting a Gospel-based, theologically-sound, pastorally-sensitive answer to that question."

The class will be lead by Scott Yant and meet each Sunday evening at First Baptist starting February 4th at 7:00 pm and finish April 8th. A poster with class information is on the church bulletin board where all interested in attending should sign-up for books. We will be accepting a donation of \$16 to cover the text cost. Please come and meet together in the spirit of growth and Christian love.







Why Do Lenten Dates Vary?

Why is there so much variation in the dates of Lent? Ash Wednesday can occur as early as February 3 or as late as March 9 (a span of nearly five weeks), and Easter can vary from March 23 to April 25.

Unlike some holidays which are held on the same date each year (such as Christmas on December 25th), the date for Easter is based on three different factors.

To determine the date for Easter, you begin by finding the first day of spring (the spring equinox). This is the first day in which daytime is longer than nighttime. This date doesn't vary much from year to year. In the northern hemisphere, it's usually around March 21.

Next, you determine the first day after the spring equinox when there will be a full moon. This can vary considerably from year to year, since a full moon doesn't occur on the same day each March (there are 13 full moons a year but only 12 months).

Finally, you determine the first Sunday that will occur after that full moon. That date becomes Easter Sunday.

Origin and Meaning of the Lenten Holidays

In many cultures throughout history there have been springtime celebrations, but the date of the Christian celebration of Easter is linked to the Jewish celebration of the **Passover**, which was celebrated at the first full moon after the first day of spring. Christ was executed and buried just before the beginning of Passover on Friday evening, so the early church picked the first Sunday after Passover—the first Sunday after the first full moon after the first day of spring—to be Easter Sunday.

Shrove Tuesday is the last day before the start of Lent, and is traditionally viewed as a last chance to live it up before beginning the solemn Lenten period. In many parts of the world it is the last day of a carnival celebration which is sometimes called Mardi Gras. Many churches observe the day with pancake dinners. This may derive from ancient times when this was the last chance to consume foods made with milk and eggs, which were forbidden during Lent. "Shrove" comes from the Middle English word "shriven" which meant to confess and be absolved from sin.

Lent is a period of spiritual preparation for Easter which typically involves fasting, penance and prayer. It was originally established by various Christian groups as an interval ranging from a few days to several weeks, and was eventually fixed in the 8th century at 40 days. The word "Lent" probably comes from the ancient word "lencten," which meant "spring."

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the 40 days of Lent. On this day ashes are placed on the foreheads of the faithful to remind them of death, of the sorrow they should feel for their sins, and of the necessity of changing their lives.

Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Easter and commemorates the Last Supper. "Maundy" is derived from the Latin "mandatum," which meant "the mandate of God."

Good Friday commemorates Jesus death on the cross. The origin of the name is in dispute. Some speculate that early Christians called this day "God's Friday." Others believe that "good" refers to God's blessings and the good news that Christ would rise from the grave.

Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of Christ, and was formally recognized as a holy day by the Council of Nicene in 325. The word "Easter" doesn't appear in the Bible, but may have come from "Eastre," the name of a spring goddess worshiped in ancient springtime festivals.

Stained glass items were priced higher and sold out on the lawn "bugs" - Lady Bug, dragonfly & butterfly; crafts more variety; bunches of holly always sell out; plus had four raffle items instead of two with stained glass nativity the favorite. Raffle: Stained glass sold 183 tickets -winner Ed. Hunter; wooden toy train sold 111 tickets -winner Ruth McQuigg; Crochet afghan sold 58 tickets winner- Shirley May; AH sidewalk brick sold 32 tickets -winner Laurie Williams.

Help problem - should have had 1-2 extras on Saturday morning to help in Tea Room - also a couple of back-ups for no-shows. Sharing floor supervisor duties seemed to go well. All representatives had difficulty finding people to work. Some reasons - too many other things happening that weekend; older workers did not want to come out afternoon or after dark. Needed people with knowledge of crafts to help with pricing on Thursday. How can we get other Partner Churches involved?

Tea Room succesful - people liked the shredded chicken sandwiches. Zion UCC paid for sandwich supplies \$30.00; Grace M.E. donated the tea mix and Jane B. provided the carrots/celery. Discussed trying to find another fragrant tea which did not use Tang (which is the expensive part of the recipe) - Shirley Irvin and Jane B. will look into this. The recipe needs to be printed and included in the tea package. Christmas cups with tea bags were non-sellers. Perhaps cocoa blends displayed in the cups would do better. Fabric bags of the tea did fine as well as the ones covered with netting. Shirley estimated 39 meals were sold, some people wanted just the sandwich as a carry-out.

Publicity was as good as we could expect in the Delaware Gazette. Have no way to gauge if other notices attracted anyone. Outdoor signs could be better - Lois suggested a sturdier frame perhaps wooden for placing in people's yards. A few placed on public property disappeared quickly. 8x10 size signs for community display and in the churches seemed to be ok.

Our history of "Soul Freedom", separation of church and state, and the autonomy of the local church. And having reasoned this out, many church members are content to lean back in the recliner and watch the world go by on the big screen tv.



A Celebration of God's Spirit

I love to listen to children's interpretations of the things they hear, particularly Bible stories. Sometimes as we listen we realize that what we mean and what they hear are very different. For instance, did you know that the angels that gave the good news of Jesus' birth to the shepherds were named Herold? And why were the people in Bethlehem telling lies on the night Jesus was born? (O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see you lie...) Children have asked me about both of those things. And it isn't just the Christmas story that is confusing... Last year, as I told the story of Pentecost, the amazing story of the coming of the Holy Spirit to give the early Christians the ability to speak and be understood in many languages, some of my children looked on with amazement. I thought they were excited and fascinated by the power and creativity and goodness of God who made ordinary people able to be witnesses of the Good News of Jesus Christ to the whole world. But when I finished the story one child, a first grader, spoke up almost immediately and asked... "When the fire came down on the people's heads, did their hair catch on fire?" I realized that was the reason for all of the wide-eyed looks. Several of the children had that same idea. I assured them that God didn't injure anyone. Some of the children looked relieved and others responded as if I had taken all of the excitement out of the story.

Well, I'm not sure that most of us understand a whole lot more than the children did about what happened on the day of Pentecost. But we do know that it was an amazing and exciting event that allowed timid people to be bold, and people with limited language skills to be heard and understood, and caused onlookers to be confused because they knew them well enough to be sure that they couldn't do what they did in their own power! And while their hair didn't catch on fire, Christianity did. And the lives of believers were never the same.

Sunday, June 3 is Pentecost Sunday. (This year, Northwestern Association will hold its third annual Pentecost Celebration at Tabernacle Missionary Baptist Church in Lima at 4:00 p.m.) It is the day when we remember the last promise of Jesus Christ... You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you. And you shall be my witnesses... As we celebrate that Christian holiday, let us do so as wide-eyed children, amazed at what God has done and can do in our lives when we allow ourselves to be weak and to live by his incredible power, and when we open our hearts and mouths to carry the Good News to the world!

NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE MINISTER

Occasionally I am asked the question, "Should our church restructure our church?" There are several factors to consider when responding to that question.

I believe that the best time to restructure is when you already have embraced a new vision as a congregation and need to design a new structure in which to carry it out. The best restructuring efforts are driven by a vision and a strategy. Restructuring involves a host of decisions. What types of decision-making groups should we have? What types of ministry groups should we have? Who should be involved in decision-making? Who should be called upon for input? How should we do common planning? A good vision will inform all of these decisions.

Sometimes congregations form a restructuring task force prior to developing a vision or in some cases as an alternative to developing a vision. Such an action usually leads to conflict as several possible visions vie for attention from the group. A restructuring task force is not an alternative to an envisioning task force and should never precede one.

It is interesting to note that rapidly growing congregations seldom put together a restructuring task force? Why? Because change is so commonplace among today's rapidly growing congregations and there simply is not a need to form a special committee to look at change. Changes are made regularly and easily as the work of implementing the vision bumps up against the various congregational structures and systems. Forming new task groups, re-routing volunteers and personnel, even adopting new expenditures are all simple decisions when seen as a necessary part of a larger vision.

Often a restructuring task force ties up key leaders and dollars from the congregation that could possibly be used in more high impact ministry-related areas. Because of that, it is best to keep develop a restructuring plan as soon as possible in order for the people to return to their ministries as soon as possible.

Should our church restructure? The simple answer is, "Only if your current structures and systems are limiting your God-supplied vision."





Thanks for the opportunity.

I found a quote recently that would have been good for Father's Day, Tools of Hope, Robert Browning wrote: "Get thy tools ready; God will find thee work." Another good quote from a country newspaper, Old Union Reminder, "Secret sins will make the headlines...eventually."

Have you noticed the increasing number of odd-ball "warning labels"? Things like the cautionary note on an iron, "Do not iron clothes while wearing them." Or, on a bag of peanuts, "Remove peanuts from shell before eating." And this one on a can of soup: "Open can. Empty contents

into sauce pan. Heat until hot." Do we need to be told how to do every simple little thing? Perhaps we do. So, how about this one, "Remember your pledge; expenses of the church go on while you are on vacation."

Have you thought recently about the poverty of our world? One-third of the world's people have annual

income of about \$100. Annual! Every year 70 million people die of starvation and 400 million suffer chronic malnutrition. 75% of the world's families have *only* wood for heating and cooking. Half of the world's children never attend school. In heaven there will be no poverty. But, remember, we pray, "Thy will be done on earth as in heaven." We

can do something about that.

NEW LIFE 2010 is the Millennial Theme for American Baptists. Quote: "Motivated by the Great Commandment, the General Commission and the Great Criteria, American Baptists seek to start 1010 new churches, reach 1,000,000 new believers, vitalize a multitude of caring ministries and so transform our congregations and ourselves by the year 2010." You all know the Great Commission and the Great Commandment. But how about the Great Criteria? There are many passages of scripture that challenge us to live out our faith in ways that work for peace and justice. We who love the Lord must find the way to make the Good News meaningful to "the less of these," the poor, the oppressed, the lonely, those who hurt, all who live without faith and with little hope. All because they have never experienced the love of Christ which can come only by seeing that love at work in the lives of God's people. That's the challenge for the New Millennium.





ABC/USA 2001 Biennial

The ABC/USA 2001 Biennial was held in June in Providence, Rhode Island. We have two reports. The first was written by Harold Van Broekhoven, and the second was written by Steve Stoner.

A "Cloud of Witnesses" in Providence, R.I. The 2001 ABC-USA Biennial

Seasoned delegates regard a convention successful if some of five critecially, good restaurants. By this standard, the 2001 Biennial was a great moment for the denomination.

- A bleary opening meeting hinted at a Program that fell short of the standards of other biennials with which I am familiar. Too much was planned for the allotted time. Speakers often seemed more interested in gaining a national stage than in their audience's needs, stamina and interests.
- There was, perhaps blessedly, little drama in the election of officers whom most of us did not know and

in votes on Statements of Concerns. We voted against violence in the schools (an expression of a more marked presence of young people in the denomination), for peace in the denomination and for the planting of new A.B.C. churches. DUH! Of greater interest, if doubtful effect, was our vote for a national shift from


Retributive Justice, that focuses on punishment and warehousing of convicted felons, to Restorative Justice, that focuses on restoring convicts to wholeness. A fifth Statement was processed and brought to a vote on the final day of the Bienniel. In keeping with Baptist principles regarding Separation of Church and State, the delegates voted by a four-toone majority to oppose President Bush's Faith-based initiatives. Delegates were already returning home or were sightseeing in beautiful Providence and Rhode Island, however, and the vote fell

eight votes short of the necessary quorum to make this an official position of the denomination. For this delegate, that was a disappointment.

• In the Exhibit Hall, denominational organizations and colleges and seminaries publicized their programs and sold next Christmas's Baptist- and Mission-related gifts. I spent much of my time working as a volunteer at the American Baptist Historical Society booth selling neat ABHS commemorative T-Shirts which celebrated Baptist history and identity. We distributed hundreds of classy TimeLines of American Baptist history and two walking tours of sites in historic Providence. Given Baptist roots in Rhode Island and Deborah's deep familiarity with Rhode Island history, the Historical Society played a crucial role in planning this Biennial and was rewarded with the best location in the entire Exhibit Hall. Every visitor to the Hall stopped at the ABHS booth and we had marvelous conversations with a cross-section of Baptists from around the country.

Conventions are really about min-

gling with friends and important people. I had great conversations with wonderful and deeply spiritual and socially engaged Baptists. I came to know



• Providence was a phenomenal venue for 2001 Biennial. Organizers fretted that the relatively high cost of this East Coast city would discourage attendance but more than 4,500 delegates and visitors attended! (I returned to favorite haunts and restaurants!) Hundreds picked up the historical walking tours prepared by Deborah and fanned out across the city, poked into churches and buildings which were the sites of land-

mark Baptist events, and walked on streets that seemed little changed from 200 years ago. About 110 delegates and denominational leaders and dignitaries stayed an extra day to take the ABHS bus tour celebrating the contributions of Baptists to Rhode Island and U.S. history. The Providence Journal provided extensive first page coverage of the convention and focused on a fruitless but good-natured debate: Was Roger Williams of Providence, RI. or John Clarke of Newport, R.I. the real

father of
Baptists in
America? This
Biennial celebrated that these
men embodied
and wrote into
history principles that
Baptists contributed to our
Nation's identity—the sole
authority (if

variously interpreted) of Scripture, Freedom of Conscience, Freedom of Religion, Separation of Church and State, the toleration of religious and theological diversity along with a commitment to associate with others on fundamental matters of common agreement despite our disagreements on some issues.

In short, this Biennial, largely free of recent controversy, was a successful celebration of what American Baptists should stand for. But it seems that in our current climate some of these principles are not easily marketed and the ABC offices (which serve these values) and the denomination (which stands upon this history of these principles) constantly face the distress of dwindling support from the churches. It is incumbent upon those of us who share and celebrate this history that we continue to support generously the national and regional ABC

offices that give voice to our heritage!

Providence RI: Removed from the convention circle by a 20-minute bus trip from my motel, I was given time to reflect on our church heritage during trips to and from the Convention Center each day. I also had time to see first-hand the present-day history in the making as well as a glimpse of future American Baptist convictions in and of the people making these trips. In the morning vim and vigor of the souls was intact on the happy bus. Returning to the motel at night we were the bus of absorbed souls, some so absorbed as to close their eyes and meditate until tapped on the shoulder to stir them to the physical task at hand. This trip back and forth reminds me of the Norman Rockwell painting, "The Outing", which we saw at a museum visit at the end of our vacation.

Upon arriving in Providence our first convention-related adventure was to drive downtown and find the First Baptist Church in America, to attend an organ concert especially held for conventioneers. We parked three blocks above the church, and I do mean "above," and walked down streets that reminded me of San Francisco. There is virtually no parking lot for the church and during the concert I was preoccupied with the realization of treading on the same floorboards and sitting in the same boxed pews as founders of both Baptist faith expression in America and the United States of America. The First Baptist Church in America was founded in 1638 and the Great Meetinghouse was built in 1775. It holds 1600 people and was physically built by out-of-work shipbuilders. Its steeple has withstood many storms and hurricanes through the years.

The Biennial was an uplifting

experience for me as I am sure it was for most. During and after the event I had a sense of a renewed desire to be more involved in not only the history of American Baptists but also the roll that we played in the history of the United States! The meetings were, well, meetings; the workshops were excellent and very informative. One in particular was a chance to meet missionaries. We were all involved at times corporately and at times meeting the missionaries up close and were able to hear the joy flowing from their hearts about each one's particular field of mission.

As charged, I faithfully voted on all of the questions and to the best of my knowledge they all passed hands down. I can witness to the presence of Harold Van Broekhoven too. As to the election of new officers, I'm not sure who won that quest. The food was, well, convention food. Enough said on that. The exhibit area was marvelous and kind of an oasis at times for me. As you may know, Karen and I sang in the convention choir and it brought me great pleasure and excitement to be able to sing with a choir of approximately 150 singers. We were angelic to say the least. We got to hear Ginny Owens, a blind contemporary Christian singer, composer and pianist. After her concert I bee-lined to the lobby to buy her CD and was lucky enough to get to meet Ginny, as well as have her autograph the inside jacket of the CD. She is a wonderful loving creature. We also heard a children's choir from Korea - whose members by the way raised their own money to pay their way to America. They were "precious", as Karen would say.

If you have never been to a Biennial you should consider going at least once; it is an experience you could build on as a faith builder as well as bring back some humbleness, which we all need from time to time. You never know what a large gathering of Christian brothers and sisters

may bring. You just might find a soulmate as Karen undoubtedly did—ask her about Julie sometime. I feel it was meant to be.

Well, thank you all at First Baptist Delaware for allowing me to be your delegate. Peace be with all of you!

RECIPES

Several folks asked Melissa Mercer for the recipes for some items she served at a recent Fellowship Time:

Fruit Juice Fizzes

- 1 12-ounce can Dole frozen juice concentrate (I used the Passion Fruit)
- 1 1-liter bottle of ginger ale 1 cup water crushed ice
- 1. Empty the juice concentrate into a large pitcher.
- 2. Fill the juice can 3 times with ginger ale, pouring slowly so the ginger ale will not fizz.
- 3. Add the water and stir.
- 4. Serve immediately by pouring over crushed ice.

Apple Brickle Dip

- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 package almond brickle chips (7.5 ounces) or English toffee bits (10 ounces)
- 3 medium tart apples, cut into chunks

In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, sugars and vanilla. Fold in brickle chips. Serve with apples. Refrigerate any left-overs. Yield: 2 cups.

Unwrapping Gifts

Last year in the weeks leading up to Christmas, I spent some time at the mall near my home, not shopping for gifts, but wrapping them. Volunteer wrappers were invited to donate their time to provide free gift-wrapping service to shoppers. The mall made donations to local charities rather than paying workers for their service. It was a wonderful experience for me, in part because I love to wrap packages, and in part because I enjoy talking with people and hearing their stories... a grandmother shopping for her grandchildren who live in another state... a mother doing her daughter's shopping since she recently had surgery and couldn't get out to do it herself... students shopping for a family they adopted for the Christmas holiday... children wanting their gifts wrapped really quickly because their mom—the recipient—was just down the hallway... a boyfriend buying a gift for his girlfriend on their first Christmas together. Each gift was valuable—whether it was a pair of striped socks with toes, a leather jacket, or diamond jewelry—because it was carefully selected for the one who would receive it.

This season, I'm guessing you've been thinking a lot about gifts, too. Most people I know have two lists - what they are giving, and what they would like to receive. In all this talk about Christmas gifts, something else almost always comes to mind for me... the Spiritual gifts God has given to us... the ones we have received. Hundreds of Spiritual gifts are mentioned in scripture. from the very practical ones given by God to the Hebrew people as they built the tabernacle - weaving, embroidery, masonry, carpentry, working in bronze and silver... to the ones the Apostle Paul speaks of in his writing – wisdom. knowledge, faith, healing, prophecy, teaching, preaching, helping, administration, encouraging, and giving. As a Baptist who holds fast to the concept of the priesthood of believers, I am convinced that just as God has called each of us to ministry, God has also provided us with the gifts necessary to carry out those ministries. Tom Bandy, contemporary author on church renewal, often states that everyone has been given a gift that the world can't do without. It is one that God has carefully selected and given to you. Many people have never unwrapped the gifts and put them to use. As you go through the Advent season, a time for preparing for the coming of the Christ child (God's very best gift to us ever), I encourage you to seek to discover the ministry

gift that God has given to you and to allow God to prepare your heart to use it in ministry in the coming year. It will be the best gift you unwrap this Christmas.

NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE MINISTER

What is a Hanging of the Greens Worship Service?

During the Advent Season many churches host a "Hanging of the Greens." The purpose of such a service is to more closely connect traditional holiday decorations with the real meaning of Christmas. Some services include hymn and carol singing, musical interludes, solos, scripture reading, poetry reading, and narration. The narration serves to explain the meaning behind the decorations as they are placed within the building. Just as the cross and communion table signify certain attributes of Christ, Christmas symbols can point us toward additional attributes.

The purpose of such a service was even more critical in the early stages of Christianity than it is today. As the Christian faith spread, people were faced with the dilemma of what to do with their old customs and practices. While some customs were discontinued, others took on new meaning. Just as people find new life in Christ, sometimes the meanings behind certain customs were transformed in order to reflect various tenets or beliefs within the Christian faith.

Below, I have listed some of the symbolic meanings carried by our modern Christmas decorations...

Candles – represent Christ as the light of the world and the star that guided the worshipers to Jesus. We are called to shine our light and not hide it under a bushel.

Advent wreath candles – mark various themes during the four Sundays in advent. One set of themes includes hope, love, peace, and joy.

Greenery – reminds us of God's creation; more specifically, the laurel and bay symbolize triumph, the holly...Christ's blood, the yew and cypress...eternal life, and mistletoe...peace.

Poinsettia – reminds us of God's transforming power as the leaves turn to red.

Evergreen - symbolizes protection and the wreaths embody eternal life

Tree – signifies the glory of Lebanon, while various ornaments can be constructed to denote other Christian ideals

Nativity scenes – obviously depict the night of the savior's birth

Whatever symbols you choose to enhance your Christmas celebration, may the glory of the Lord come to you in new ways this Christmas season.
