The Cracked Pot

A water bearer in India had two large pots, each hung on the ends of a pole that he carried across his shoulders. One of the pots had a crack in it, and when the water bearer carried it from the stream to the house, it arrived only half full. The other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water.

For a two years, the bearer delivered one-and-a-half pots of water to his house after each trip from the stream. But the cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection, and was miserable that it was able to accomplish only half of what it had been made to do.

That is because I have always known about your flaw. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walked back from the stream, you have watered them. For two years, I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate the table. Without you being just the way you are, there would not be this beauty to grace the house."

Moral: Each of us have our own unique flaws. We are all cracked pots, but it's the cracks and flaws we each have that makes our lives together so interesting and rewarding.

Take each person for what they are, and look for the good in them. There is a lot of good out there. Blessed are the flexible, for they shall not be bent out of shape.

Remember to appreciate all the different people in your life. Or, as I like to think of it, if it hadn't been for the crackpots I've known, life would have been pretty boring.




Personals

• KATHY CHESSER's father, Wynson Hope of Atlanta, had a heart attack shortly after having hip surgery. He had quintuple-bypass heart surgery, and is now home and doing well.



In 1853 our church founders began regular meetings, first in the Presbyterian Church and later in a rented hall. They purchased land on Franklin Street (occupied by a stable at the time) and in 1858 our first church building was completed. Overflow crowds attended a three-day dedication service.

The photo above shows that church, which stood at the same location as our current church. It had brick walls and had shutters on the windows. Portions of its foundation and walls may have been incorporated later into our current building.



In 1897 the sanctuary was extensively remodelled, the Sunday School room was added, two vestibules and a tower built, stained glass windows installed, and the outer walls were faced with brick.

In the photo above, note that there is no bulletin board or shrubbery in front, and no railings on the stairs. On the right side of the photo there is a dirt road beside a fence, but no house. A small building in the back yard appears to be an outhouse.


Dear First Baptist Family:




As we gather for worship we bear witness to hope and to the ultimate protection that comes from trusting God for our future. We renew that sense of community that holds us together in good times and bad.

STATEMENT REGARDING NEW HYMNALS May 7, 1930

The supply of books "Sursum Corda" was about 32 copies most of them in poor condition.

At a Church meeting in February the music Committee was requested to investigate the matter of securing new Hymnals and bring in a recommendation.

A few weeks later at a Fellowship Supper the Committee reported by having present 20 copies of the book "Hymns of the Christian Life" loaned by the Presbyterian Church. The Pastor explained the books, selections were sung and on recommendation of the Committee, the Church voted to adopt this Hymnal and to secure as many copies as possible by each one buying one or more copies and presenting them to the Church.

A subscription paper was presented and in a few weeks 63 copies were subscribed and paid for. All was done in a willing and beautiful spirit to provide this up to date book so essential to worship.

The hymnal "Hymns of the Christian Life" was first used on Easter Sunday, April 20, 1930 at which time six members of the Sunshine Class were baptized. This class had been first to subscribe for a copy of the new hymnal.

Mrs. LeRoy Maugans presented the labels for the books.

Enclosed is a list of the subscribers. Also the receipted bill for 63 copies plus a gift copy for the Pulpit.

SANCTUARY STORIES

Way back, half a century ago, when I was drafted to teach 5th and 6th grade Sunday School class, Mrs. Crane—a beloved teacher, pillar of the congregation, honored Girl Scout leader and intrepid rider of bicycles—called on me to tour the sanctuary with her one Sunday afternoon.

She wanted to tell me stories about the sanctuary so I could pass them on to the children and to newcomers to the congregation.

She told me that yes, it was true that the beautiful pews and pulpit in the remodeled sanctuary were the gift of one family, but that we were not to know who until the donor had died. And we did not know that family's name until Mrs. Larry C. King passed away; then a little brass plaque was put on the first pew on the north side of the sanctuary (the side closest to the Sunday School room). It says, "Presented in memory of my husband, Larry C. King. September 1947." The Kings did not belong to our congregation, but attended sometimes. They were related to the Via family, who were important members of our church.

The beautiful communion table was the gift of Florence and Laura Wagner, sisters who grew up in the church and served in many ways. The table is in memory of their parents.

Before the oak pews were in place, the pulpit and pews were a dark walnut. The walnut pulpit is still in use in the Sunday School room. Perhaps, if you ask Peter White where it is, you might get to see one of the old pews, and then be properly thankful that you don't have to sit on them on Sundays.


Dear FBC family:

SANCTUARY STORIES

This is the 2nd installment in a series of articles by Jean Wickum about our sanctuary.

When Mrs. Crane walked me through the sanctuary those long years ago, she brought to my attention the graceful arch over the baptistry, and the window above it. A poorly-aimed BB gun had put a hole in the window. Mrs. Crane's daughter, Margery Adams, who is an artist, had climbed up and patched the hole with colored glass. It was not quite the right color, but it did us for many years. This was at a time when artists who worked with stained glass were hard to find. It was repaired again when we installed protective glass on all the sanctuary windows.

At the time Mrs. Crane was talking to me, there was no picture in the back of the baptistry, and the drapes were a faded blue. The NITHFUS class (the adult social group) provided the money for the deep red velvet drapes now in place. Donna Brown, then an employee of Lazarus, helped purchase the fabric at an advantageous price, and Jeanne Ekelberry made the drapes. They are lined, and very heavy.

If you are wondering about the name NITHFUS... well it meant Nothing Is Too Hard For US, and in addition to having some rollicking good times together, they provided a lot of good and needed things for the church. (It helped to pronounce the class name if you could lisp.)

The picture of Christ with arms stretched out in welcome, in blessing, was a gift from Ernestine Frost, staunch member of our church and mother of Geneva Evans. She had come into some money, she said at the dedication, and was gleefully planning on how she would spend it when she suddenly thought of the need to share with God. The picture was the result of her thoughts, and she was so very happy to present it to the church. It means a lot to me, too, for Ernestine carried on the tradition of this church...a portion, a tithe, of what we have always goes to others through our mission outreach.

As you look toward the front of the church, count how many times the symbol of the Trinity is repeated...in the carvings of the wooden screens, even the three steps up to the altar.

Dear FBC Family:

As you all know we are celebrating our 150th Anniversary this year. One of the ideas to come out of the Sesquicentennial Committee was to establish an endowment fund for the future. We decided that the purpose of this endowment fund was to provide extra money for the educational ministry of the church. We researched a variety of ways to invest the funds and discussed ways of administering the fund after it grew large enough to provide regular income.

At every step along the way we have shared our thinking, hopes, and dreams. We met with Karen Horsman, who is the American Baptist Foundation representative for our area. At our quarterly business meeting on April 30 we voted to establish this endowment fund with an initial contribution of \$1000.00 from some previously unaccounted for interest from the Jones estate.

We will now enter into the fund raising stage of this endeavor. Our hope is that we will have \$10,000 pledged or given by the time of our homecoming celebration on August 10, 2003. I want to stress that we are asking for gifts to the fund that are over and above your usual contributions. Our initial goal is \$10,000 because that is the amount we must

have on deposit with the American Baptist Foundation before we can start making regular withdrawals. No other church funds will go to this account. No money in the memorial

accounts will go to this endowment

or equipment to be used in Christian Education.

We have always been a church that has stressed the importance of Christian Education. This endowment fund will be a way that we demonstrate that our celebration of the past 150 years of our history lives on in expectation of the years ahead.

SANCTUARY STORIES

This is the 3rd installment in a series of articles by

Jean Wickum about our sanctuary, based on a conversation

she had 50 years ago with Helen Crane.

We have such a wonderful organ. Mrs. Crane loved the sound of it, and told me that it was a gift to the church from a man named Morgan Savage. He was recuperating from a serious illness in the house on the corner to the south of the church. From his upstairs window he could watch the rebuilding of our church, and he was so interested in the process that he gave the money for the organ. Jim Van Brimmer found the bill of sale, dated 1898, for \$1,000. Imagine what the organ would cost today! It is a Barckhoff, built in Mendelssohn, Pennsylvania. (I hope that Jim Van Brimmer and Peter White will collaborate on an article about the organ in a future newsletter.)

It's a tracker-action organ (meaning that it's all mechanical) with about 550 pipes, and it's the second oldest in the city. But Mrs. Crane was only interested in telling me about the beauty of the music it produced, and that just before Wick and I came this church, the organist married the lead soprano in the choir and carried her off to live in Columbus, leaving us with no organist.

At that time the pipes were painted a beautiful pale blue with an intricate design in gold paint. It was a real show piece. Mrs. Crane, however, told me that while she wanted me to share these stories with the children and young people of the church family, I was never, ever to tell them that if they stared at the designs on the pipes long enough, they became a row of little monkey faces!

11:15? —Adjourn to the church lawn for dinner on the grounds prepared by Fred DeBiasio (barbeque w/North Carolina sauce).



Our guest preacher on August 10 will be Rev. Ted Stephenson from Indianapolis. As most of you know, Ted is the son of Sophia Stephenson and the late Rev. James

B. Stephenson, who was our pastor from 1947 to 1987.

After morning worship, we'll have an outdoor picnic at the church with our meal prepared by Fred DeBiasio.

After the picnic we'll have a Time of Remembrance. This will be an optional, informal activity in which people can share stories about our church.

If you can not attend this celebration, you are encouraged to send a

letter for a memory book being developed to commemorate 150 years of fellowship, worship and community service. The submission deadline for letters is August 10.

SANCTUARY STORIES

This is the 4th installment in a series of articles by Jean Wickum about our sanctuary, based on a conversation she had 50 years ago with Helen Crane.

When Mrs. Crane got around to talking about the window on the sanctuary's south wall, I wanted her to tell me first about the meaning of "B.Y.P.U." It had been tugging at my memory since I first saw it, but I just couldn't figure it out. "Well," she said, "that stands for Baptist Young People's Union, and now-a-days you call it the B.Y.F.—Baptist Youth Fellowship." (Today we call it A.B.Y.—American Baptist Youth."

She said that the young peoples' group had probably raised the money to pay for that window. We speculated on the projects they might have had to get it paid for.

Then she drew my attention to the picture itself, which was Christ knocking on a door—the door to our hearts. "Where," she asked, "was the latch; the door knob?" There is none. And that means that Christ knocks and asks to come in, but only we can open the door and let him into our hearts. A powerful lesson told in a beautiful picture window!

And the cherub in the circular window above is a tribute to and from the man who donated our organ.

Heaven forbid your mind should wander during the sermon, but if it does, let it dwell on the beauty and the message of our south-facing wall.

There are women pastors there, and women generally enjoy equal status with men in work and social circles. The biggest concern for local women is the future of their children. In general, the culture is not a future-oriented one. It's hard for farmers to focus on growing a new crop that will take several years to mature and produce a good income; they prefer to focus on the immediate problems and benefits of typical crops such as rice, and on day-to-day survival! The Akha women who work in the craft industry use treadle sewing machines,

since they are easier to maintain, and they need more of them. When you travel there by taxi, you must wear seat belts in the front seat, but in back, there might be 15 people standing for the ride!

More news to follow. Thanks for the opportunity to represent you among the American Baptist women of Ohio.





SANCTUARY STORIES

This is the 5th installment in a series of articles by Jean Wickum about our sanctuary, based on a conversation she had 50 years ago with Helen Crane.

hen you're looking at the sanctuary's south wall, be sure to notice the small cabinet hanging at the rear of the sanctuary to the left of the double doors. It usually contains a silver pitcher and two silver goblets. They are a communion set that was given to the church by Doctor S. Shattuck and family in 1897. Upon occasion, we have used it at Maundy Thursday communion—a touching reminder that our congregation has a contingent in heaven. The communion set is now on display in the glass case in the Assembly Room as part of our sesquicentennial celebration

About those swinging double doors on the south wall—they go into the south vestibule. It's never used as an exit, but over the years it's been used as a Sunday School room. Mrs. Crane explained to me that the group of ladies who met there came into being a Sunday school class when Miss Alice Whittier, a member of the church in the early 1900's, called out a group of women from the other classes. She went class to class, hand picking women to come be in *her* class. She would be the teacher, and would tell them what she wanted of them.

Miss Whittier said there were many things which needed to be done about and for the church, and she wanted her class to be "doers." When they asked what was needed, she said "whatever." So that class became the "Whatever Class" and they lived up to the name. When I first heard of them, I noticed that tasks just got done—money appeared to finance needs; help was there.

I never met Miss Whittier, a mover and shaker in both the congregation and the community. How I envied Mrs. Crane her years of belonging to such a group. Maybe we need a *new* "Whatever" class!


Sesquicentennial Homecoming Celebration







Benevolence Fund

Earlier this year the Board of Deacons decided to change the name of the fellowship fund to the current name of Benevolence Fund. This action was taken to more accurately describe the use of these funds. Money for this fund is collected on the first Sunday of every month in a special offering.

The Board of Deacons and the Pastor have the responsibility of disbursing funds from this fund to meet local needs. Every month we send a contribution of \$50.00 to People in Need. Other local ministry requests are handled according to need and the balance in the fund. Earlier this year we sent \$250 to the PIN back to school shoe program.

This fund is also used to meet emergency needs for members of our congregation and others that come to our attention. Examples have been to assist families with funeral needs, emergency transportation needs, and memorials.

All payments out of this fund remain confidential except for those given to local ministry groups. If you become aware of a particular need please speak to your deacon or to the pastor.







Dear FBC Family:

November is a traditional month for the church to talk about stewardship. The combination of the coming winter months and our Thanksgiving celebrations give us reason to think about all the blessings God has bestowed upon us.

At times our stewardship promotion becomes a matter of emphasizing the church budget for the coming year. I once did a stewardship promotion for a church in Kansas that concentrated on our commitment rather that meeting a budget. The campaign was successful in helping people to think about stewardship in new ways.

One way churches talk about meeting budgets is to ask everyone to do their fair share. I am convinced that this is an unBiblical way to think about our personal stewardship. The Bible emphasizes that giving is between you and God. The principle of tithing, or giving 10%, of your income back to the Lord is well established in the Bible.

In many ways this is countercultural and counter-intuitive. In a time where almost everyone asked in polls responds that if they had 20% more than they currently have, then they would be happy, God asks you to be willing to live on 10% less than he has given you. Those who have believed in the scriptural challenge will give testimony that life is more satisfy-

ing when they are obedient to God in grateful and joyful giving.

Within the next few weeks you will be receiving a letter from the church with detail about our 2004 budget as well as pledge forms. In the meantime I ask you to prayerfully consider what your personal giving says about your relationship with God. The Bible teaches

that God is able to provide for all of our needs. Perhaps it is only our faith and trust that needs increasing.

Trustees Notes for October and November

• Furnace Rooms Flooding:

The flooding of furnace rooms during heavy rains has been resolved by digging a two-foot hole outside the window and filling it with gravel, creating a "French" drain. This gives the water a chance to soak into the ground before running over the

sill of the basement window into the furnace room. This other big answer to the problem is keeping the gutters cleaned out so they don't run over in a hard rain. The gutters have been cleaned out at the church and parsonage. The furnace room has been cleaned out and has stayed dry since the project was completed.

- Three pianos were tuned by Richard Dacks. The cost was \$198.00.
- All furnaces at the church were inspected, tested, and had their filters changed. The boiler at the old parsonage was checked and the pump was oiled. The water heater at the church had a new pop-off valve installed because the old one was corroded shut. The burners were checked because the furnace room had been flooded. This work was by Don Patrick at a cost of \$201.96.
- The Steeple: An inspection from a crane with an aerial bucket revealed a bad deterioration on the lower parts of the slate roof. The metal work and flashing around the dormer window in the steeple is all rusted and rotted out. This has caused leaks that must be fixed. The slate is past its 100year life expectancy. The diamond-shaped slate on the steeper part is okay, but much of the lower part of the roof where the slope is more gentle will have to be replaced. It is just crumbling apart. All the flashing will be redone in copper. Your chairman got a ride up in the bucket to view the steeple roof. This work is to begin soon as possible and may be

underway before press time. The work will cost in excess of \$5,000 dollars and will be done by Mid State Contractors of Marion. They did the tuckpointing last year. Other contacts were made, but they weren't interested since we couldn't afford to reroof the entire steeple.
