

The Board of Christian Education will meet at the church on Tuesday, January 16, at 7:00.


Willard Fogle

Willard Guy Fogle, 56, died on Friday, December 1 at The Arbors at Delaware, as the result of carbon monoxide poisoning that occurred on November 11.

Will was born in Marysville and was a graduate of Milford Center High School. He spent most of his life in Delaware. He was the owner of Will's Barber Shop on William Street (which was previously owned by his father-in-law Cap Gabriel) from 1969-1985. Following that he was employed in the Delaware City Schools maintenance department.

Will had been a member of First Baptist for many years and his service included the Board of Trustees, the Pastoral Relations Committee, the Nominating Committee, and the Pastoral Search Committee.

t's the middle of winter. The snow has been plentiful, the air brisk, and the sun quite scarce. Energy is running low and almost everyone I run into is impatient for Spring's arrival. The problem, is that it's only the beginning of February. The first day of Spring is 45 long days away. How are we ever going to make it?

As I sit here, typing away, I'm also painfully aware that my love of winter is quickly being eaten alive by my hatred for sinus infections and allergies. To put it bluntly: I can't breath and I'm sick and tired of having a stuffed nose and swollen sinuses. As I've told more people than probably want to know, I'm on my third round of antibiotics since the beginning of December, and nothing seems to help. To tell the truth, I feel about my allergy/infection the way most people feel about winter: it's been here long enough and I'm ready for it to just go away.

About this time each year it's very easy to become depressed and withdrawn and perhaps a little lazy. Funny how much we allow the weather to effect our mood and frame of mind. Have you ever noticed how these winter doldrums, if we let them, can have an equally strong impact on our church? Making it difficult for us to breath properly. We get sluggish, weak, with no energy for doing much of anything at all. It's all we can do just to get out of bed and make it to worship on Sunday morning.

Now, before we get too depressed, lets remember that even though our breathing may sometimes be labored, that we're alive as long as we can still muster enough energy to breathe. The good news is, that as human beings with bodies made of bone and flesh, we have to worry about things like



being able to breathe. But, as a church, the Body of Christ, we don't have to worry, because we don't have anything to do with it. Nothing at all. At this point, I'll presume that you'll want to ask, "How can this be?" Well, let me tell you.

I usually reserve this speech for the June Newsletter when I write my annual piece about Pentecost. But this is a special situation, so I believe we could use an early reminder this year. Pentecost, as we'll recall, is the cele-

bration of God's gift of the Holy Spirit (a.k.a. H.S.). The reason to bring this up in February, is because the H. S. is a gift for all time and isn't just effec-

tive during the season of Pentecost. Without this gift, there is no Church. With the Holy Spirit, God breathes life into us, enabling us to become and be the Church. Without the breath of God, the Church doesn't have a chance.

So what do we do? Stop struggling. Don't worry about feeling down in the dumps, sluggish and lazy. Don't get discouraged because we feel as though winter will never end. Spring will come. It always does. In this bleak, mid-winter, when it's difficult to breath on our own, let's remember to allow God to breath for us. Because it is God's breath that will give us the ability to believe that Spring has come, even in the midst of the longest winter.

Let us, as the body of Christ, renew our faith, and receive the breath of life that God gives to us. It's always there. We forget sometimes, but when we finally remember, all we have to do is take a deep breath.



Brian is the big brother of Megan, and son of Mary and Richard Boham who live east of Kilbourne.

He is a normal third grader at **Buckeye Valley East Elementary** School who enjoys reading, T-ball and kickball; whose least favorite subject is math and favorite one is art.

"He's a trooper!" says his mom, "he has a good attitude." That's an accurate description of this young man who is no stranger to hospitals and surgeries.

Brian was born with an abnormally thick left heart chamber, which causes the left ventrical to pump with difficulty. He also has inoperable mitral valve prolapse, which allows blood to flow backwards into the heart. Brian underwent experimental pacemaker surgery in June 1994, in an attempt to reverse the way the heart charges. But the surgery didn't bring about the hoped for result.



Lots of flowers have these same qualities, but they don't get the same kind of press that this one flower gets. What makes it so special? Why has it become the symbol of love? Why do so many women want to have these sent to them on special occasions like their birthday, anniversary and especially

I must admit that I haven't always understood the big fuss people, especially women, have always made about roses. I used to scoff at the tradition of sending this flower as a gushy act of sentiment that was too cliche and therefore pretty tacky. Lately, how-

ever, my heart has softened in regard to this old fashioned practice. Perhaps it has something to do with the fact that I've recently received one or two of these sentimental blossoms, and I now understand the power that this simple flower has. However, don't ask me to explain it, because I can't.

Maybe it has something to do with the fact that the biggest day for sending these flowers falls in the middle of February when it's still winter—cold, bleak, with no sign of living, blooming plant life in all of the great outdoors. A time of year when many are beginning to think that this dreary weather is going to go on forever and ever. So we send a rose or two or twelve, to remind ourselves that Spring will come again, and the world will once again come alive with leaves on trees and flowers in yards and vegetables in gardens. Winter will not last forever.

As you receive this newsletter, we're still in the middle of winter during the season of Lent. Snow and cold is still in the forecast, and Spring seems a long way off. The world

literally impossible to have life without first having death. Physical life or spiritual life. This is what we believe as Christians. Not only do we believe it, but we have experienced it again and again, if nowhere else, in the experience of the seasons. We watch the earth around us each year, as the flowers, trees and grass fade away, turn brown and die. We endure the winter with its bare branches and frozen, barren ground. Then we watch with both impatience and wonder, as what appears to be dead and lifeless, mysteriously comes back to life again.

> In the midst of Lent, as we wonder about the ability of life to come out of something that appears to have no life at all, I give to you the only thing I can, that is, The Rose:

When the road has been too narrow. and the night has been too long, When you think,

that love is only, for the lucky and the strong Just remember, in the winter, far beneath the bitter snow Lies the seed, that with the sun's glow, in the spring, becomes the rose.

Life and death are never separated. Even in the most desperate of times, when we're caught in what appears to be a death that can never be overcome, there is life. It's always there. The challenge is in learning to face both of them with equal faith. It's only in learning how to die, with the knowl-

This is odd, because I'm finding it impossible to think the serious thoughts of Lent which remind us that we are dust and to dust we shall return, without also considering the Good news of the Resurrection into new life that comes with Easter and with Spring.

I'm reminded, once again, that it's

edge that it will lead to life, that we ever learn to live. As long as fear prevents us from facing and living through the times of death that we will most certainly have to face along the way, then we will never know what true life is.

As Lent continues, and we prepare ourselves for Easter, let us remember the rose. Let us hold on to our faith in the mystery of death and life and the hope that love is with us and comes to us again at Easter.



Good News Letter

t's now Tuesday afternoon of Holy Week. This article was supposed to be finished last week so I could meet last Sunday's newsletter deadline. But thanks to my lack of creativity and a very gracious editor, I'm just now getting to it.

Lately, it seems like I've been literally scraping the bottom of my barrel of creative ideas. There's just not much there. Of course, this does happen from time to time, and

it's not uncommon to have such an experience on a big day like Easter. Most people, preachers being the worst of all, have very high expectations for this most holy of days. The real problem, though, is that so much of what's important about these days is over-preached to the point that it becomes cliche. So, there's a tremendous amount of pressure to come up with a new, fresh, stunningly brilliant idea. I always want to think of something that is about Easter, but is so unusual and different that it really gets people to think and explore their faith at a deep and profound level. This is a tall order.

So, I did the only thing that a person under this kind of stressful pressure can do; I procrastinated. And as you know, procrastination can be just as exhausting and stressful as productive work. So, I was very tired yesterday morning at 8:30, after only 9 brief hours of

sleep, when my alarm went off. I can't really say how, but my alarm stopped ringing, and my head was returned to the pillow. I woke up a few minutes later and it was 11:00. So much for getting an early start to the day.

Well, I had some reading to do for my Bible Study, and so I stayed in bed where it was warm and comfy. When I finally crawled out of bed into the cold, cold house, climbed into the shower and staggered downstairs to make some coffee, it was already 1:00 in the afternoon. Now, as I mentioned, the house was rather chilly. This resulted from the fact that Don from Patrick Heating and Plumbing

had come to the house on Friday and removed by dysfunctional thermostat. He thought he'd be able to come and try to fix it on Monday. And since it was Monday, and I hadn't heard from him, I picked up the phone to call and see what was going on. By this time, the weather had turned cold again and it was 35 degrees outside and not much warmer inside.

As I picked up the phone, I saw Don's truck pull up in my

driveway, so I greeted him at the door and told him that I was just going to call him. While I was talking with him, I looked over at the wall where the empty wires had been sticking out of the wall and saw that there was a new thermostat. I was confused. "How did that get there?" I asked. "Well," he replied, "I put that in earlier this morning, but I had to leave to get another part." Now, I was even more confused. "You were here this morning?" "Yes," he answered, "I thought you were gone, you mean you were here all the time?"

This is what had happened: On Friday, I had shown Don where I hide my house key, so he could let himself in if I happened to be gone when he came to work on the house. So, he arrived at 9:30 on Monday morning, knocked on the door, rang the bell several times, then let himself in. He then proceeded to shout, "Is anybody

home?" a couple times, before deciding the coast was clear and getting to work. And, as I understand, he stomped up and down the stairs from the main floor to the basement more than a few times.

The really scary thing, is that I never heard a sound. I slept through the whole thing. I was so out of it, that I even forgot that I was supposed to meet Sheila Rutherford at noon to discuss and plan for the youth group.

When I was a little girl, my dad used to say that I'm such a sound sleeper, that I could probably sleep through the end of the world. My fear, isn't so much that I'll sleep through the end of the world, but that I'll sleep through Easter. If my



alarm clock can be dismissed so easily, I'm a little concerned that I won't be able to wake up next Sunday, after losing one hour of sleep for the sake of daylight savings, and will miss out on the whole thing. You can probably bet your Easter basket that I'm going to set more than one alarm and have a friend or two make wake up calls.

It's so easy, if we're not careful, to sleep through the important stuff. We don't mean to. We have every intention of waking up. But, for some reason, we just can't wake ourselves up out of our deep, deep sleep. However, if we oversleep on Easter, we miss out on life. How easy it is to get so caught up in the daily tasks and routines of living, that we forget to pay attention to the important business of life.

Sure, it's true that Easter happens every year. It's a sure thing. But, we must be careful not to get used to Easter and take it for granted. God's activity of love in our lives is more than a given, it's also a gift. And this is what I challenge myself, and you to re-remember today. This is our hope: that we will know that the God who raised Jesus from the grave, has the power to raise me from the soundest sleep and to the grace to raise all of us to life. May we have the courage and wisdom to embrace this life, so that we will have life and have life more abundant.

FIVE GOOD ANSWERS TO FIVE BAD REASONS

RESPONDING TO EXCUSES PEOPLE GIVE FOR NOT ATTENDING CHURCH

he story is told of a farmer who asked to borrow his neighbor's plow. The neighbor replied that he couldn't lend it to him because he needed the plow to comb his children's hair.

"What?" the farmer replied incredulously. "Why would you need a plow to comb your children's hair?"

"When you don't want to do something," answered the neighbor, "one excuse is as good as another."

For people determined not to go to church, the same principle is true. No argument for attending is good enough, and no amount of argument will change their minds. Many people—including Christians—truly believe they have a legitimate case for avoiding church.

By dealing honestly and directly with their objections, we may persuade them to give church another chance. They may even accept an invitation to accompany you to your next worship service.

What follow are some of the most common excuses people give for not attending church and some suggested responses to them.

BY PETER MARCANTEL a lifestyle that falls short, for example. Sure, there are people like that at church; but they're also at work, in social clubs, and maybe even in your own home! Everybody wants to look good to others. But in church, people are encouraged to drop their masks and be real. God will only help people overcome faults that they recognize within themselves.

1."CHURCH IS BORING"

Right. Church is as boring as you want to make it. That's because church isn't designed for spectators—it's for participants. For a church service to be interesting, you must play an active role, expecting to receive something or give something of value when you go. The person who joins in the singing, who prays with faith that God will answer, who listens with an open mind to the teaching, and who reaches out in love to other people will rarely be bored.

2. CHURCH-GOERS ARE JUST A BUNCH OF HYPOCRITES"

A hypocrite is someone who says one thing and does another—a person who pretends to be perfect while living

3."I CAN'T LIVE UP TO THEIR EXPECTATIONS" Whose expectations? We often

Whose expectations? We often think everyone is watching everything we do or say and judging us accordingly. Consequently, we expect more of ourselves than other people do. Christianity isn't about rules and regulations; it's about a relationship with God. God deals with us as individuals. As we learn to trust Him and surrender different areas of our lives to Him, He will teach us how to live. We're all learning and growing, and nobody ever really arrives. If somebody in the church is judging you, that's their problem—not yours.

4. "IT'S MY DAY OFF AND IT'S A HASSLE TO GO"

This is probably the most honest reason of the five. Getting up and preparing yourself and the kids for church on Sunday morning can be a hassle, especially if you're not in the habit of doing it. But think about this for a minute. We discipline ourselves to go to work every day, to get the kids to school, to go to diet classes, to exercise, to go shopping. We do these things because we see them as necessary parts of our lives. Doesn't it make

sense to put some effort into our spiritual development as well? Besides, many people acknowledge, once they make it to church, that the trip is well worth it.

5."I CAN GET TO HEAVEN WITHOUT GOING TO CHURCH"

True. Eternal salvation isn't based on church attendance; it's based on God's forgiveness of your sins through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. But there's a lot more to Christianity than going to heaven when you die. The Bible's major emphasis isn't on heaven; it's about life on earth. God wants us to learn interdependence, not independence.

Living the fullness of the Christian life is simply impossible without meaningful relationships with other Christians. Through these we learn to love as God loves. That kind of love will reach the people around us and make a difference in the world.




Good News Letter

As I sat down this afternoon to begin writing, there was a violent thunderstorm accompanied by a torrential downpour. As you know, this comes at a time when we've had way more than enough rain. The farmers are saying if it doesn't stop soon, then they're never going to get their crops in on time. And, just in case the staggering humidity of the past week has clouded your memory, let me remind you about the winter we had: the 5 months of cold and snow and very low wind chill factors. And don't forget, that just last week we had a frost warning, followed by a few days of 89 degrees and 100% humidity.

Perhaps you're wondering why I have so much time to ponder the excesses of our fine Ohio weather? Well, it's because the thunder keeps causing my computer to short out, and so I am forced to sit and aimlessly stare into my blank screen. During this period of forced creativity, I've come up with this little gem: "too much of a good thing isn't good." Which is a great companion to the ever popular "All things in moderation." But you know, the more I think about these quotes, the more I realize that the Bible doesn't really agree. In the Bible, we read things like, "Pray without ceasing," "Sell all that you have, and give the money to the poor," and let's not forget this one, "Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the


right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile. Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you." Talk about excess. stay away from the Bible and steer clear of the Christian Faith.

The great thing about our Faith, is that although it is quite demanding, we can always know, without a doubt, that our God isn't a God of moderation, but a God of extreme excess. And while the cost of discipleship may be pretty steep, we also have the assurance that God's love is as extreme as God's demands. We can know, without a doubt, that our God gives us a love that is beyond love; a love that is so excessive that it inspires God to do anything in order give us life. The rain may seem excessive, we may

begin to believe that it's never going to end and that we should probably re-read those instructions for how to build the ark, but at least the rain is a good reminder. Let us remember the neverending, excessive love of God, let us open our hearts to be filled, and let us pray without ceasing that God will cause us to love in this same reckless, excessive way. 

It seemed like a good idea at the time.

It was my first full day as Camp Pastor at Senior High Frontier Camp at Judson Hills. And, from my point of view, the vine look very sturdy. It was hanging from a tall, thick tree, and

there was plenty of room to swing. All the kids were swinging from it, and having a great time. I thought to myself, "I think I'll give that a try, it looks like fun."

Unfortunately, I don't know my own strength. And, while I may have the strongest legs in the state, my arms have a little something to be desired. But, of course, I didn't know this valuable piece of information until I was hanging out over a pile of rocks.

The bruise, if you saw it, covered more than half of my left thigh. And, by 6 o'clock that evening it was clear that my right ankle was going to be sprained.

At that point, I learned my lesson, and did what any sane, responsible, health-conscious 31 year old would do: I went on a two hour initiatives course, followed by a day of rappelling and a 2-day canoe trip on the Mohican River. All of this was made possible by my new friend the "ACE bandage," which gave me the support and encouragement I needed.

Will I ever learn? My mom's been asking that question of me for years and years and, if you ask her, she'll

tell you no. And, she's probably right. I'll probably keep right on doing all kinds of risky things, just because they look fun or interesting or challenging. It's what makes life exciting.

But, I have learned. I know now that I'd like to be able to swing from a vine

or a rope next year at Frontier camp, and that I don't have enough upper body strength to do it without doing a fair amount of damage to the rest of my body. So, I know that between now and next year I have to get to the gym and work out those biceps.

We will start Sunday School again next week. A new year for Christian Education in our church. Exciting. Maybe not. Thrilling. Who knows? Fun. I hope so. Coming to Sunday school isn't known for being a real risky thing to do these days. Anyone can do it. It doesn't take special knowledge or physical skills or any particular amount of courage. You don't need any training. It's just a sort of come-as-you-are sort of adventure.

It's like me going to the gym to work out my biceps. One day, we are going to be faced with a challenge. God will call. We will want to answer. We will be asked to do something within our life of faith that is risky, challenging and maybe even danger-

ous. It's been known to happen. When that happens, we'll want to be able to say, "here I am, I'll do it-I'm up to the challenge." When we get out into the middle of this challenge, we don't want to fall. That's why we come to Sunday School.

On the surface, Sunday School looks harmless. Just an ordinary (sometimes boring) thing that church people do. But, don't be fooled by appearances. 

Why does our mind choose to remember some things we wish it could forget forever and to forget things that we'd like to hang onto for more than a fleeting moment? I don't know. I can't remember.

I wish I had a mind for remembering practical things, like when to change the oil in my minivan or to look at the gas gage once in a while. It'd be nice if my mind could hold onto the multiplication tables so I could do my banking or do simple adding and subtracting

So, in the midst of my remembering of who I've been in the past five years, in my relationship with all of you, I'm going to pray that I'll also remember to be thankful for who I am today and who I will become in the future. Please pray with me.

So, back from my Florida "mountain" I tackle my job, work to fulfill my calling. And as I prepare for search committees, I have the incredible sadness of knowing that some of the very gifted, obviously called by God, women I met will never be considered by churches. Never mind that God has called. Never mind that the women have said "YES" to the Holy One. Never mind that the women have studied and prepared. Never mind that even the computer recognizes compatibility. Churches continue to say "We're not ready yet." May God send to us the day when we will search the mind of Christ and ask God to send us the servant appropriate to our needs—regardless of the age, race, marital status, or gender. What a novel idea that we would so trust God. I pray for a new Pentecost (Acts 2) when God's Spirit will fall on all flesh (even on me afresh) that we might hear our sons and daughters prophecy, that we might listen to the dreams of our elders and catch the vision given to the younger in our midst. Even so, come, Lord Jesus.

And back from my "mountain" I find churches wrestling with insurance—yes, information meetings are coming soon—and budgets. I hope and pray that your church will be generous in time and money for Continuing Education for your pastoral staff. I find myself remembering the Bible study, taught by Dr. Molly Marshall of Central Baptist Theological Seminary. She reminded us that in original languages, the text for "compelled" by Christ means encircled, surrounded by Christ. I pray that as your church deals with budget matters concerning your pastor that our faithful God will make known the ways most appropriate for your congregation to embody the Christ who loves us and to compellingly surround your pastor with love and support.

Called. Compelled. Charged. O God, let us be faithful.

NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE MINISTER

As a pastor, I always appreciated special emphasis Sundays. The special emphases helped to focus attention toward a specific cause. Sometimes we would gear an entire worship service toward the emphasis, while at other times we would focus upon the cause during the pastoral prayer, children's sermon, communion meditation, or other worship moments.

It is important to keep in mind that special emphases are not an "all or nothing" item. The emphasis may be woven into one part of the service without taking over your other theme. Your church may be in the middle of sermon series or preparing to launch a new ministry or building program when a special emphasis arises. The special emphasis may or may not integrate easily into your worship theme for the day.

When incorporated thoughtfully, special emphases can help discipline our corporate prayer life in the same that lectionary texts have the potential to discipline a preaching ministry.

This month contains four very salient special emphases. October 6 is World Communion Sunday. What a wonderful day to emphasize our connection with the Body of Christ. Many churches also begin receiving the World Mission Offering on that day.

October 13 is our designated Men's Sunday. I hope that you take this opportunity to lift up your men's ministries.

The special emphasis on October 20 is for chaplains and pastoral counselors. I encourage you to invite your nearest chaplain or counselor to worship on that Sunday, or even better, adopt one of our chaplains or counselors for a special prayer emphasis or visit one of their sites. Our Region Directory contains a list of ABC endorsed chaplains and pastoral counselors in Ohio.

October 27 is Reformation Sunday. I always viewed this Sunday as a time to link with neighboring protestant congregations. I even am aware of a pulpit exchange between two Catholic and Lutheran congregations on Reformation Sunday.

Be creative. Celebrate. Pray. Intercede for the needs of our world.



However, when things are bad, and we can't possibly imagine them getting any worse, like in the middle of winter when it's 20 below and we're buried in a blanket of snow and ice, we can take comfort in the assurance that things will change. Life goes on, and the seasons change. The snow will melt and the sun will shine.

Let us give thanks to the one God who created the world with wisdom and beauty and who gave us the seasons of life. May we accept this gift of life, of the world around us and the people in the world, with humility and respect. May we receive this gift with the hope that God will give us the knowledge and the strength to care for it. Amen.

Financial News

Church Finances A Concern

Church Operating Receipts of \$30,412 for the first 3 quarters of 1996 are \$1766 less that last years receipts of \$32,178 and \$6,119 less than the budget of \$36,531.

Receipts represent only 83% of the budget.. We are averaging\$157 per week under budget and will fall short of the budget by over \$8,000 at this pace.

Outreach Missions Receipts of \$4819 for the first 3 quarters of 1996 are \$688 more

that last years receipts of \$4131 but they include \$941 for Building on Common Ground which was not a part of last years finances. True receipts represent about 92% of the budget for 3 quarters.

M & M Medical/Dental Insurance Terminated

Earlier this year, CIGNA, who is the current health insurance carrier for American Baptist Church professionals, informed the M&M Board that they would discontinue administering the ABC health insurance program as of January 1, 1997.

Apparently CIGNA is concerned about legal matters having to do with insurance regulations in the various states, and the fact that their

> administration of a national program would probably require exemptions by the various state's insurance departments.

Both the M&M Board, and ABC of

Ohio have been hard at work to find suitable alternatives for health insurance for its pastors and other church employees who were covered under the old plan. Viable alternatives <u>have</u> been found, and our church employees will have the opportunity to enroll in one of the two or three available plans that will provide essentially the same protection as the CIGNA plans.

Supplemental insurance plans will also be available for persons enrolled in Medicare programs.

Insurance costs to churches could rise as much as about 16% as we move into the new system. However, annual increases in the cost of health insurance has been routine for some years now, so this isn't too surprising.


